God save the Queen



Winnie the Pooh is exactly the same age as her Majesty the Queen. AA Milne's famous 'Winnie-the-Pooh' story book was first published in October 1926, the same year that Queen Elizabeth was born. Indeed Milne dedicated a collection of poems to her when published later in the same year.

As a young Princess she was said to have loved the stories, and a china nursery set depicting hand-coloured images of Christopher Robin and Pooh soon became a treasured possession. Many years later, in a book entitled 'Winnie The Pooh and the Royal Birthday', published in 2016 to celebrate her 90th birthday, the two actually met one another. Over the course of the Jubilee in June there will undoubtedly be many reflections on Elizabeth II's 70-year reign. Apart from occasional mistakes along the way (and we all make those don't we), she is widely respected for her tireless service to the country and for her unwavering faith in Christ.

But I am sure the Jubilee will also bring much well-wishing for the future, as she continues to serve in whatever capacity her health allows her to! The rest of the Royal family will also be out in force with multiple heirs to the throne supporting her majesty. It really will be a time of looking backwards as well as looking forwards.

There is a brilliant chapter exploring just this subject (looking forwards and backwards) in that first AA Milne book - 'In which Pooh and Piglet go hunting and nearly catch a Woozle'. In this chapter it has been snowing, and Pooh begins to follow some tracks he has discovered, wondering if they might belong to a Woozle!

An excitable Piglet soon joins the circular walk until suddenly Pooh stops, having discovered another set of tracks, and realises that ... "This...whatever-it-was...has now been joined by another...whatever-it-is... and they are now proceeding in company".

As the footprints head around a clump of larch trees the friends follow together (concerned the animals may be hostile), until shockingly a third set of tracks join the first two. "What?" said Piglet, with a jump. And then, to show that he hadn't been frightened, he jumped up and down once or twice more in an exercising sort of way". Unsure if they are now tracking two Wizzles and a Woozle or indeed two Woozles and a Wizzle, the friends carry on round until they realise there are now four sets of tracks in front of them.

At this point, fear gets the better of Piglet and he makes his excuses, just as Christopher Robin calls down from his vantage point in a high Oak tree and asks Pooh what he has been doing. The boy has watched Pooh walk round the trees twice by himself, and then twice with Piglet. Pooh then sits down and thinks about this for a little while, and then tries putting his paw into one of the tracks. "Yes,"... "I see now," said Winnie the Pooh. "I have been Foolish and Deluded," said he, "and I am a Bear of No Brain at All."

Christopher Robin rapidly assures him that he is the best bear in all the world. "Am I?" says Pooh hopefully. And this reassurance cheers him up so much that he is able to leave the stresses of the morning behind him and head straight home for lunch.

What a great story, and I love the shift in perspective! Pooh's fear and confusion is compounded because he is so focused on what is immediately in front of him. He does not look backwards or look up, and he does not pause to think about the bigger picture. It takes Christopher Robin, with his 'umpire's chair' view to help him to work out what is going on and put him back on the right track.

How often do we as Christians end up stuck in a rut, going round and round in circles, making the same mistakes, and repeating the same sins over and over again. Only God has the vantage point and the salvation solution to get each of us back on the right track. Paul in Philippians commends the approach of lifting our eyes to the skyline and focussing on God's input.

"Not that I have already obtained all this, or have already arrived at my goal, but I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me. Brothers and sisters, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus". Philippians 3: 12-14

I also love the fact that whilst Pooh has been a bit daft, Christopher Robin still wholeheartedly encourages him, and in doing so immediately offers him freedom from his embarrassment. Pooh then chooses to accept these compassionate words, and immediately moves on.

1 Corinthians 2: 9-10 references Isaiah when it says

"What no eye has seen, what no ear has heard, and what no human mind has conceived the things God has prepared for those who love him— these are the things God has revealed to us by his Spirit."

God has wonderful plans for us; and through Jesus' death on the cross, he offers us freedom from our past, and the opportunity to step into an exciting future of opportunity, (both in this life and the next) with Him alongside us. The crucial thing however, is for us to take the 'Pooh' approach to this, so often demonstrated by the Queen! We need to humbly recognise our mistakes, listen to God's encouragement and calling, and to set off unhesitatingly to make strides towards the future he has planned for us.

We give thanks for Pooh Bear, and especially for Queen Elizabeth II. Her long and faith-filled reign has been an inspiration, and we pray that God may continue to fulfil His plans through her for many more years to come!


6:30pm Evening Worship/ Communion Services



Recitals at St Luke's

For some years at St Luke's, have hosted Sunday afternoon recitals on a monthly basis where we invite singers and instrumentalists (who have links with the church community or a Watford connection) to come and bless us with a concert. They are usually held on the second Sunday of the month at 4.30pm, running for around 40-50 minutes followed with light refreshments. The performers that we host share with us their wonderful talents, sometimes in aid of a particular charity (Peace Hospice, Christians Against Poverty etc.). Though entry is free, donations are welcome to support St Luke's church and its ministry, and to cover artists' expenses. It's a fantastic opportunity to act as a double-edged sword in both giving recitalists a wonderful venue and space to perform in, as well as their way of supporting us as a church.

During the pandemic our afternoon recitals were stifled because of red tape limiting gatherings. Due to the repercussions of the pandemic, the arts industry has suffered as a result. With live music gone and only just remerging from the last 2 years, musicians and especially young musicians have been hit financially, as for them performing live is their livelihood and only source of income. So we feel it is in our heart to offer our church building to support more professional singers & musicians as they rebuild their careers, especially now as we've began to emerge from a pandemic.

We are blessed as a church community to have such a beautiful nave in our building, and with its acoustic treatments below and around the balcony, it presents a perfect venue to rehearse and perform in for young professionals as well as for other chamber groups and local Symphony orchestras.



As we begin to bring back recitals on a more regular basis, we are encouraged to see audience numbers growing, from the church community and also from our local community. We hope that as we continue to host more recitals throughout the year, it would begin to carry on connecting to those local to us through music and be a good witness.

Some of our regular recitalists include Soprano Nina Cook, violinist Matthew Bethel, and Oboist Henrietta Cooke. Our most recent recital on the 8th May featured special guest tenor Michael Hogarth and on the piano his son who you may have recognised from somewhere. The recitals can give a platform for keen amateur musicians as well!



Spark In The Park

While others will be enjoying a calm (I hope) first week to their summer holiday, I am looking forward to re-joining a large team of volunteers running a holiday club in Welling, South London.



Spark in the Park is run by a team of local churches from Welling and Bexleyheath, and I got involved in the London branch of Spark in 2015, after helping at the Coventry Spark from 2010. It's definitely something I feel called to make time for, and I love being part of the team! I am overjoyed that Spark is able to run again this year, after two years away.

What is Spark?

Spark is almost impossible to describe. It's almost a holiday club, but is better imagined as church-led activities for children and young people, in the park for a week in the summer. The team offer face painting and craft sessions, sports activities and there are always some bouncy castles - all manned by members of local (and not so local) churches wearing bright yellow t-shirts - and all completely free!

Every day we take a pause in the activities to tell a Bible story and sing some worship songs (with fun actions), and to explain why we feel called to bless the community in this way.

We also run some events in the evenings including a quiz night, a karaoke night, a football tournament and a pamper evening.

Who can come?

Anyone can come along - all the activities are free (there is a small charge for refreshments). Pre-booking is not necessary, as parents and guardians are expected to



stay on site and remain responsible for the children. Children and parents often come and go, as there is no fence or gate - and there is a play area nearby!

Because it's free, it does get busy and the queues for the bouncy castles and for face painting get quite long.

Why do I go back?


Being part of the team is a blessing and a time to focus on God. We worship each morning before opening to the public, and pray throughout the day. It is a wonderful opportunity to witness, and to demonstrate that although the churches may be different, we represent one large family of God.

Have you ever marvelled how, in the gospels, Jesus seems to do, listen and care so much - and yet still has the time just to be with His Father and with His friends? Too often, my daily times reading Scripture, praying and allowing God to ask questions have to be squeezed into the diary. Even at church I can find myself focussing on doing, rather than being.

I find it really helpful, from time to time, to take a few days' complete rest from my usual routines and set the time apart for God. Sharing it with other Christians can be even better; relaxing and talking about some of the things Jesus is doing. I suppose that is what Sabbath is — and it's what the annual New Wine conference provides!

After a two-year interruption for Covid, a small group from St Luke's will be going to New Wine's United A conference this summer in Peterborough. We would love you to join us. Some will camp on-site; others of us are staying in B&B.

John Tyson (lead pastor at Church of the City, New York) will be teaching from the Bible each morning and there are big arena meetings each evening. The worship is always focussed on who God is: Father, Son and Holy Spirit — and worshipping alongside 10,000 believers is a real highlight. Being an accountant, I will try and attend the maximum number of seminars throughout the day — but there is no need and choosing one or two activities that are really right for you is more important.

We try to eat together – and that is often when God underlines what He wants each of us to take away. There is a huge variety of teaching – but each year I have found something that God keeps wanting me to return to.

On Sunday afternoon 8th May, many friends and colleagues from over the years gathered at St Andrew's Church in honour of Rev Ian Pankhurst to mark the occasion of his retirement.

We all know how engaged Ian is with people and with the local community, something we cannot imagine he will ever retire from.



He has always been very supportive of joint initiatives by the local churches and Christians across Watford, including the annual Good Friday walk of witness through the town. In addition he is a dedicated volunteer as a leader for the local 'Talking Newspaper' for the visually impaired, work he has done over many years.

Ian is also a keen outdoors man, going for many hikes and camps over the summer break. During his time at St Luke's he was an enthusiastic member of the Men's' Walking Group. Over the years he has regularly joined in with the Easter Monday pilgrimage to St Alban's Abbey.

I have worked with Ian over many years, primarily officiating as organist or pianist at church services, weddings and funerals. A regular request is one of his favourite pieces, the Toccata by Widor for Organ, always necessitating that extra bit of practice

to keep it up to scratch. His technical skills came on leaps and bounds with Covid forcing services to be online.

A meticulous planner and thoughtful communicator, services are always led with sensitivity and encouragement. Many of us at St Luke's will remember lan for the Taize services he led, and what stillness and peace we experienced in this setting as we put aside the issues of the world and our everyday lives in this oasis of calm, enabling us to focus on Christ Himself, the Prince of Peace.

One of the highlights of the year is the Queen's School annual Carol Service at St Luke's, which lan, as a former teacher of the school, has traditionally led, with a warm pastoral heart. The School seems to take over the whole building, creating an energy and buzz, always a high point of the year for lan. Sadly the most recent Service had to be cancelled due to Covid.

News from some of Our Mission Partners



Greetings from Ruth Guinness in Malawii

April has flown by – I've enjoyed seeing photos of primroses and other spring flowers in the UK, whilst here the garden is mainly green as we come to the end of the rainy season.

At the beginning of April I really enjoyed my visit to Nanjoka, where I stayed with the Wheatleys. It was good worshipping in the village church and having conversations with the local pastor, a former student. He is now heading up a discipleship ministry within the Africa Evangelical Church. We went to a meeting of a number of pastors and their wives held in a small village called Sani. It was great to meet up with the pastors again — most of whom are former students — and to build on the connection we have. In the time of sharing, they all mentioned quite difficult challenges, including the pervasiveness of traditional religious/cultural practices, leaders chosen for the wrong reason who are not willing to serve, and the need to build or re-build church buildings. The Wheatleys and I had a couple of nights staying by Lake Malawi — I always love the opportunity to be by the lake and enjoy God's creation.

Over Easter the local Africa Evangelical Church congregations all joined together for a conference at the local church where I worship. It was wonderful worshipping with a large number of people. There was good teaching too, which was an encouragement.

I have continued with zoom calls, still getting to know people and developing my picture of what is going on in theological education in SIM. This week I had two zoom meetings with other Ministry Point Persons – people who have a similar role to me in other areas such as health ministries, youth ministries, business ministries and many others. It was helpful to hear stories of how they have collaborated in the past, and I trust opportunities to work with others will open up in the future.

Here in Malawi, I have been meeting with others working in the area of church leadership development and discipleship. Coming up I will be involved in planning a retreat for pastors and their wives. I will also be involved in discussions related to the relationship of SIM and the Africa Evangelical Church.

Watford Foodbank's 10th Anniversary

In 2012, Steve Bolton and others in Watford saw the need and had the vision to start a foodbank, and in July 2012 Watford Foodbank began its operation. We are a registered charity which is affiliated to the national

Christian charity The Trussell Trust, which operates a UK-wide network of over 400 foodbanks.

Our aim is to provide food and support to local people in times of crisis. Non-perishable food is donated by churches, schools, businesses and individuals, and we have supermarket collection points at Tesco, Sainsburys and Asda. Food is taken to our warehouse off Imperial Way in north Watford where it is packed into parcels and taken to our four distribution points: Wellspring Church Centre, Christ Church, St Michael & All Angels, and South Oxhey Baptist Church. People in crisis can go to one of over 100 organisations around the town such as Citizens Advice, social services, some doctors, and some schools and be given a foodbank voucher which they can redeem at a distribution point.

In the first few years of operation, clients received emergency food with up to only three successive parcels, but over the last couple of years this model has become increasingly unrealistic as many clients have medium and long-term issues with benefits, debt, or physical and mental health issues, often in combination. So they are requiring regular food parcels and not just emergency ones. Some clients are in work, some are trying to find work, and many are on the government benefit system Universal Credit, but find in the current economic climate that their monthly payments are just not enough to live on. As low income is their major problem, they come to us on a regular basis. We are working in co-operation with Citizens Advice Watford and the Mind Hertfordshire Network to try to address some of the underlying reasons why clients need to come to us. We also try to work closely with New Hope and Watford and Three Rivers Refugee Partnership. Most clients come from the central Watford, Holywell and Meriden wards and South Oxhey – few from the Cassiobury estate!

The Trussell Trust's long-term goal is to end the need for foodbanks in this country. When we began ten years ago, we did not think that there would be a need for a foodbank in Watford in 2022. It is not an anniversary we really wanted to reach. We are currently supplying over 500 food parcels per month to individuals and families and the numbers are rising. The economic situation means that for many families the choice is now whether to eat or to heat, and unfortunately the trend looks to be getting worse. Recently we are noticing a general decline in the food donations we receive and we are having to purchase more food items ourselves.

We are very thankful to the individuals at St Luke's who have supported us with donations of food and money, and with prayer over the past ten years. Everyone

helping at the foodbank is a volunteer, and if you feel you would like to help then please contact us. If you would like to donate non-perishable food there is a collection point in the Gathering Area with a list of which items we would like.

Watford MP in government role

Dean Russell, MP for Watford has been the Private Parliamentary Secretary to James Cleverly MP (Minister of State of the United Kingdom for Europe and North America) since late 2021.

This is significant, as he has been quite involved with various debates and questions in the House of Commons about human rights abuse and persecuted Christians.

International Ministerial Conference on Freedom of Religion or Belief: London 2022

On 5th and 6th July, 2022, the UK government will host a human rights conference to urge increased global action on Freedom of Religion or Belief (FoRB) for all.

The conference will bring together governments, Parliamentarians, faith and belief representatives, and civil society to urge increased global action on freedom of religion or belief for all. The overarching themes of the conference will be preventing FoRB violations and abuses, and protecting and promoting freedom of religion or belief.

How can I help?

If you'd like to help your persecuted brothers and sisters, here are some things you can do:

- use the World Watch List booklet (or on the Open Doors website www.opendoorsuk.org/persecution/world-watch-list) to pray for Christians in the various countries
- contact your MP (Dean Russell is Watford's MP) and ask them to do what they


can to fight for the rights of persecuted Christians


Neil and Lydia encouraged the children to dress up during the service as they introduced us to each part of the armour
