



A New Season, A New Thing

Isaiah 43:18-19

Forget the former things, do not dwell on the past. See I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up, do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the desert and streams in the wasteland.

It's very easy to dwell on the past. The pandemic has heightened this, with pre- and post-pandemic comparisons. It's changed for many of us our usual habits. The return to a 'new normal' is taking a fair time, especially with more shocks such as Ukraine, inflation, global warming. This keeps life for many in an anxious state. The call is to continue to look to God, where our help comes from (Psalm 121). At St Luke's, it has been great to see some normality return with the church heavily used by groups, perhaps even more than before! The start of new groups, e.g. the Cassiobury and nearby Community Choir on Wednesdays at 8pm (restarting on the 14th September) by our music director has been great. Along with a very positive holiday club in early August, and 18 church members attending the New Wine Conference which everyone found inspiring, it's been a good summer.

However, the New Wine Conference only just happened! They struggled with attendance around 1/3 down, and with volunteers. I use this example

to highlight the fact that the church nationally has struggled to recover from Covid and the various lockdowns. Lower numbers and a loss of people willing to serve is a national reality. St Luke's has not been immune to this national trend.

The gift of service mentioned in Romans 12 verse 7 is initially needed if we are to return to health and growth as a church. Romans 12 verse 1 talks about us being living sacrifices, a people offered up to God, seeking his will for our lives. The church needs servers. However, will we ignore the call? God is calling us to use our gifts, natural and spiritual gifts and for some just to pitch in and help, so that those at the forefront of serving feel supported, have sufficient helpers and don't get worn out.

This autumn is a real opportunity to not only return to some normality, but to do "New things". God is on the move, a new thing will happen, it will spring up, the question is will we perceive it? The autumn changes that have been hoped for will happen and God will bless them if we pray and participate. Below, I draw your attention to a major change to our worship.

The Evening Service (from October 2nd)

The most substantial change will be a new look, new time (5:30pm) evening service called "Encounter". It will start at 5:30pm and have a very different structure to our previous services. There will be band led sung worship for 20-25 minutes, bible reading, an address and prayer ministry. Within that we expect there will be room for the Holy Spirit to move, for spiritual gifts to be used and testimonies shared.

Who is this for? Obviously, anyone is welcome but we are particularly aiming to attract those who like a "New Wine" format to attend and also families with older children/ youth who find sport on Sunday morning/ afternoon interferes with attendance on Sunday mornings. From the beginning there will be a late Junior/ early Secondary school group (approx. school years 5-9) for young people to attend after the time of sung worship. Older young people are encouraged to stay in the whole service.

The service begins on October 2nd and we will trial it for 9 weeks until early Advent (December), when the Christmas services begin. It will be a time of experiment, it may well develop, more groups may be required in the service, maybe an older teenage group might meet after the evening service. We are taking the step, praying hard and seeing where God leads us! This new service will be widely advertised among church members, connected groups to our estate and beyond.

As you read this, God may be calling you to attend or even help in some area. If you are, please contact Jeremy Hogarth for music, Neil Brookes for help with young people or Ann MacLeod or myself for prayer ministry; all can be reached through the church office (office@stlukeswatford.org or 01923 246161).

This autumn can be a new start. The Pandemic changed many things including church attendance; many still stay at home watching the livestream. Can I encourage you to return! For the cautious, masks can still be worn, communion is still carefully administered, and there are more spaced out areas to sit if desired. You are greatly

missed, and if there is no medical reason to stay at home, we would love you to join us again regularly, at our morning or evening services.

God is doing a new thing! Will we perceive it?

An Invitation to Alpha 2022

Centuries before the birth of Jesus Christ, a prophet called Isaiah brought this message of promise to God's people.....



How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news, who proclaim peace, who bring good tidings, who proclaim salvation...your God reigns! (Isaiah 52v7)

Well, at St Luke's church, we believe this message found it's fulfilment in the Gospel – the Good News - of Jesus Christ, his life, death and resurrection. And we would love to be a part of those 'beautiful feet' by sharing this good news with as many people as possible.

One way to do this is by running **The Alpha Course** at St Luke's Church on Wednesday evenings 7.30pm in the Autumn term 2022. If you have never attended an Alpha course before, why not join us and explore the Christian faith for yourself? So.....

What is an Alpha Course and what is involved?

Alpha is a ten-week course which covers the basic beliefs of the Christian faith, for example God, Jesus, Holy Spirit, Prayer, the Bible. Throughout the course, we hope to give people an opportunity to investigate these Christian beliefs by discussing them in a friendly and comfortable environment.

And to do this, Alpha begins at 7.30pm each Wednesday evening with a cooked meal - a great chance to get to know others in the group! Afterwards we watch a DVD presentation looking at some aspect of the Christian faith, followed by discussion in small groups. The whole evening will be finished by 9.45pm.

Is Alpha for me?

Yes, Alpha is for everyone, but especially:

Those wanting to investigate Christianity for the first time

Newcomers to the church

Church members who want to brush up on the basics of the Christian faith to strengthen and encourage their own journey of faith

To help you decide if Alpha is for you, we run an Introductory Supper as a taster

evening with 'no strings attached' - although of course we would love you to remain for the remainder of the course!

What does the course cost?

There is no charge for the course; however you are welcome to make voluntary


New Wine – United 2022

Partners In Mission Giving

As many of you know, St Luke's has a long tradition of supporting Mission both at home and overseas. This is largely expressed through our network

of Mission Partners, and our support takes various forms including most importantly prayer, but also financial support.

You may not be fully aware of how much money we give, to which Mission Partners, and where that money comes from.

It has been a long-standing principle of the PCC that St Luke's should give to Mission ten percent of our total income. In 2022 this is projected to come to £27,000. The money is allocated by the Partners in Mission group (or PIM for short), who have the difficult task of deciding which of many worthy causes we should support this year.

Our Partners fall into two main categories:

Mission Partners

These are individuals we support with whom St Luke's has had a direct relationship. Either they have been sent out onto the mission field with the blessing of St Luke's, or they are people that we have come to support over the years. The key thing is that the support is for the individual not necessarily the mission organisation they work with.

The current list of PIM's official Mission Partners is:

Ruth Guinness – working with SIM in Malawi

Mark and Sarah Gelsthorpe – working with OMF in Japan

Sally Miller – working with Friends International in Lancaster, UK

Alfred Olwa – Bishop of Lango Diocese in Uganda

Alastair Paterson – working on Bible translation work in Nepal

Clive & Andrea Thomas – working with INF in Nepal and All Nations College in the UK

Partner Organisations

St Luke's also provides financial support to a number of agencies, at home and abroad. The organisations that we provide the greatest annual support to (£1,000+) tend to be local agencies. These include the Watford Schools trust, the Town Centre Chaplaincy, New Hope, the Peace Hospice, Alternatives, Watford & 3 Rivers Refugees, & ASCEND.

Further afield we support Open Doors (supporting persecuted Christians), Rafiki Thabo (providing grants for education in East Africa), Nireekshana ACET HIV/AIDS clinic in Hyderabad, India, St Luke's Hospital in Malosa, Malawi, and Kisumu Children Trust in Kenya.

Of course, St Luke's members support many other mission societies and Christian

agencies on a personal basis, and seek to publicize their activities from time to time. It would be fantastic to be able to support them all, but PIM's belief is that the church is more effective in its giving if we target a smaller range of organisations with larger sums rather than spread our net too widely.

Information about all our Mission Partners can be found on the Partners in Mission notice board (in the corridor opposite the office), or on the church website; and a full list of the amounts paid can be found on the PCC noticeboard.

Greetings from Ruth Guinness in Malawii

I'm writing this from the home of the Wheatleys in Nanjoka, a 5 hour drive from Blantyre. I came up on Thursday to be with them for a few days. It's lovely to have a change of scene. Although the drive is long, I love the landscape on the way – red earth, baobab trees, mountains in the distance, and bright splashes of colour from bougainvillea bushes.

August has been busy both on the compound and in the office. We've had builders extending the height of the front wall, and I've had a few other jobs done, including mending my washing machine and various things which often take longer than expected! The Richters' two daughters were here over their holiday from university, and I've enjoyed some fun times with the family.

SIM Malawi's Spiritual Life Conference was at the end of July. It was good to see people, and fun to have the freedom to walk in the small game park. I was due to speak at the Africa Evangelical Church retreat for pastors and their wives immediately after that at the beginning of August, but this has been postponed again. I'm not sure when it will happen.

I have started to meet weekly with the Principal and Academic Dean from the Evangelical Bible College of Malawi. We are working through a book by an SIM colleague, Steve Hardy, called 'Excellence in Theological Education', which I hope will be helpful.

Looking forward to the next few months, I will have a lot of travel. At the beginning of October, I will be travelling to Angola with a team from the Association for Christian Theological Education in Africa (ACTEA) to help with the accreditation of a Bible institute there. In November I plan to be at a global conference run by the

International Council for Evangelical Theological Education (ICETE) in Turkey. More on that in future newsletters!


Butterfly at St Lawrence

Interaction France

7-15 August

It was a joy to return to my favourite chateau in the Pays de la Loire for my 9th Interaction camp this year. The camp felt much more like normal, with campers able to come from the UK again for the first time since 2019, allowing the camp to regain its distinctive bilingual atmosphere. We were also blessed with incredible weather, with bright sunshine and temperatures in the low 30s every day until the last one, and even then we were appreciative of some refreshing rain!

My role was a bit different this year, as I was back leading a dorm group of campers, rather than being with the "animefs" (animateurs en formation - leaders in training). This was great fun, although a bit of a challenge being with a group of predominantly French teenagers who spoke at breakneck speed! They were a delightful bunch though, and really seemed to revel in the talk programme and Bible studies, which was wonderful to see. The philosophy of the camp is to present the message of the Bible in a way that is faithful but not forceful, allowing everyone to mull over what is said, ask questions, and respond only as they feel comfortable. We are also asked to avoid making the talks feel too much like church. As an example, mine, on the theme "who is Jesus?", ended up containing a discussion of questions of identity, a game of human "Guess Who?", a "Stranger Things" quiz and a rendition of Joan Osborne's "(What if God was) One of us"...

Alongside the spiritual and language elements, the camp contains a relentless programme of fun activities, from sailing to canoeing, from Maths sessions about complex numbers (guilty!) to silly games in the chateau (the picture shows one such of these: the classic "save the falling egg" game). For one activity, a friend and I found ourselves dressed as members of Abba, dancing about a bit then telling the campers to find other leaders disguised as Abba fans around the local town, to gain their trust and get them to reveal an Abba song that formed a clue (for some far-fetched premise about another thing for which Scandinavia is famous: the Northern Lights - don't ask)! It was a day of much hilarity, gratuitous singing and potential loss of street-cred if my students in Watford ever found out what I was doing!

Sadly, we had a few disciplinary matters to deal with on camp this year as a couple of campers, who were clearly facing some big challenges in life, pushed the boundaries more than we are used to. I was grateful for the wise leadership of our excellent Director, Keith, and for a very supportive team who stepped in for each other as folk needed help. It was a reminder though that the experiences teenagers face in life can be really tough, and is a prompt to keep praying for them, that God would meet both their spiritual and emotional needs.

We were hugely encouraged to learn at the end of the week that two French former campers/animefs, whom I have known for a number of years, were getting baptised the following Sunday. Camp has been very significant in both of their journeys, so it is wonderful to see how God has used it to lead them to take such a significant step.

I am very grateful to those from St Luke's who prayed for the camp this year. It was a week of great blessing, and one that I found very spiritually enriching on a personal level too. Interaction runs bilingual camps every Summer in Belgium and Germany as well as France, so if you'd be in interested for any young person you know, do speak to me or have a look at the website: <u>https://interactioncamps.org/</u>



Deanery Synod, June 28th 2022

Michael, Wendy S and I represented St Luke's at Deanery synod at St Matthews, Oxhey. Their newish vicar, Revd Sam Frampton, led evening prayer. It was a challenge to read the psalm observing the pointing but a reminder to me to read Scripture more slowly to absorb its meaning. Readings were from Ezra 3 and Romans 9.

Colin Heath, from St Peter's Bushey Mill Lane, had been made Deanery Lay Chair.

The Revd Dr Peter Waddell, our Rural Dean, led the meeting, where the main business was to discuss the Parish Share. The Deanery Standing Committee had thought through this very carefully. The sum we pay is displayed each year on our small print notice board in the car park corridor. The Share is derived using a formula, the product of church attendance and a complex formula relating to the relative prosperity of that parish and congregation. It was interesting to learn that our largest church in the Deanery, Soul Survivor, is not included as it is self-supporting, but that it is voluntarily making a contribution. Several of our churches have an interregnum at present and circumstances mean that we need to pay rather more next year in order to support the ministry of the Deanery.

We heard that Diocesan Synod details can be found on the Diocesan website. There are financial cuts afoot in this year's Diocesan budget, likely to include reduction of staff at the centre, a reduction in the number of Curacies, and some retiring stipendiary clergy not being replaced.

We were kept up to date with General Synod matters discussed this year by our representative, the Revd Jon Stevens, executive pastor at Soul Survivor.

It was good to meet in person but our three year term is racing to its conclusion. Our next meeting will be on October 19th.
