Following the Star



Before we reach the Christmas story, there is a time of being prepared or getting ready. We call this Advent. In the bible story, this is reflected by many journeys and supernatural activities.

Angels journey from Heaven to visit Mary and others at the beginning of the story.

Mary and Joseph travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem to register under Quirinus' census. The shepherds travelled from the hills outside Bethlehem. However, the most impressive travellers were Gentile wise men from another country and certainly not of the Jewish faith.

But something moved the wise men as they looked at the stars and spotted a comet moving across the sky. So they followed it. God had clearly spoken to them, how is unclear, perhaps an inner conviction or a longing that would somehow be fulfilled by their journey. And journey they did, from modern day Iran (Persia) — a costly and tough journey.

They reached the Holy Land, stopping off in Jerusalem but finally reaching the Messiah king in Bethlehem, probably many months after Jesus' birth.

Perhaps as you read this you are struck by a longing for something more, a longing for home that an earthly home doesn't fulfil. Christmas is a time to discover afresh the call of heaven – the call to know, here and now, the good news that the angels proclaimed to the shepherds. It's a time of being with others, family and friends, but also with God, recounting the incredible story of Jesus the saviour born at Bethlehem.

St Luke's will have an exciting range of services for all ages (see details in the magazine) and it will be wonderful to celebrate Christmas this year in a more normal year.

However, with an international crisis with the war in Ukraine, a cost of living crisis in the United Kingdom and global warming leading to extreme weather events, normality seems difficult to find at this time. Our Lord Jesus was born, lived among us, died for us on a cross and rose again to show us this life is just a taster for the world to come.

That is the great Advent hope, we celebrate in the four weeks before Christmas itself. Yes, looking forward to Christmas but also to a future where "there will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain for the old order of things has passed away". (Revelation 21:4)

As we say during Advent,

Jesus says, "Yes, I am coming soon".

Amen. Come Lord Jesus!

So come and celebrate with us at St Luke's this year, and know the love, joy and peace the Christ child of Bethlehem brings.



Christmas is a time of celebration as we mark the birth of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

Christmas dinner is a time to open a bottle of wine. But what do we choose? Wine and food go closely together, you choose a wine that goes with the food you are eating: e.g. fish would have a white wine and red meat would have a red wine. For many meals it's quite straightforward but full Christmas dinner is complicated! The large number of tastes means a careful selection of a wine that can cope with but not dominate as to ruin the experience of the meal.

Greetings from Ruth Guinness in Malawii

Dear friends,

Warm greetings from Blantyre, Malawi.



It's been a strange week here, as I've been confined to my home following a positive COVID test a week ago. Thankfully I'm now feeling quite a lot better, although I still tire easily, and am heeding advice and resting lots.

Thank you for praying for my visit to the Higher Institute for Evangelical Theology (ISTEL) in Angola at the beginning of the month. It was a very worthwhile trip. ISTEL hosted the ACTEA Visitation Team excellently. We stayed in a nearby hotel, and I was delighted to find that the hotel grounds had lots of trees and flowers. I was refreshed each morning by wandering round the grounds before we walked to the college, particularly enjoying a pair of African Paradise Flycatchers and some of the tame Common Duiker that lived in the grounds.

It was a great experience to see another college, and a privilege to come alongside them to listen to how things are going. I was impressed by their commitment to their vision of forming servant leaders for the church in Angola. I was also thankful that those I worked with most closely spoke English, although most larger meetings were in Portuguese.

The journey itself was quite an experience and gave me many opportunities to depend on God (especially when I was on my own without other English speakers). I'm so thankful for God's love and faithfulness, evident in many ways over the course of the trip.

Looking ahead, the consultation of the International Council for Evangelical Theological Education, in Izmir, Turkey, is coming up. This follows on from a number of zoom sessions in which ICETE has enabled dialogue and collaboration between people working in formal and non-formal theological education. There will be about 500 people, representing more than 90 countries, at the conference which runs from $14^{th} - 18^{th}$ November. I'm looking forward to lots of stimulating conversations, and to learning from many experienced people.



combined have enabled some staggering achievements (including a bungy jump in a wheelchair!), he's a wheelchair basketball champ and now works in the hospital. His passion and enthusiasm is an inspirational testimony of what 'He' can do.

Next up are the '70th' inaugural prayer meetings and celebrations in Surkhet and Nepalgunj (in the mid-west) where INF runs two small hospitals (primarily focussed on leprosy and rehabilitation).

Clive will be heading to Nepalgunj tomorrow for 10 days - he will be photographing the events and taking photos of INF's community programmes and medical services. As many of the 'field staff' will be in town, he will be running workshops on photographic 'story telling' for reporting to donors and prayer supporters - there seems to be real enthusiasm to build local capacity in this area. Please pray for travelling mercies and for good interactions through the week.

Meanwhile, back-at-the-ranch, I will be working on promoting some of our priority expat vacancies (I'll send you a list in due course) and orientation of new INFers and other things. The All Nations' Explore course I'm running is going well and we're currently looking into developing a Chinese version. We're also producing a version of the EnVision course with Dutch subtitles and, hopefully, a version contextualised for the Austrian market. We trust you are well and that those in the UK are enjoying the warm autumn!


David Attenborough clips of bioluminescent creatures,


make many crafts, and celebrate that Jesus is the Light of the World!



Each time we gather to 'worship', to sing, I'm reluctant, uncertain, asking, "What can I bring?" Songs don't feed the starved, heal the sick or end war.

I hear the guitar, the piano, the drum and Lord, I am praying, "Let your Kingdom come..." but the words on the screen are not words from my heart, my motives are mixed and I'm falling apart.

I hear others singing, so pure and sincere but then look inside me – it's not pure in here.

This song makes a vow but I cannot take it, You said, 'spirit and truth' so I'm not going to fake it.

I don't want to sing 'cause I feel that I should, because everyone else does, or to make me look good.

In me, in the world there is so much that's wrong but it's sanitised, airbrushed right out of the song.

When it's all, "Hallelujah, rejoice, praise the Lord' the struggle and turmoil and pain are ignored.

There's dancing for joy but where's the repenting? If we're always upbeat, there's no room for lamenting.

These songs don't acknowledge Your love manifest in weakness and failure, through our worst not our best.

They sing about triumph, victorious secure but I'm doubting and hurting and lost and unsure.

So, I come, sit in silence, it's all I can do, I'm searching for truth and I'm longing for You.

I don't know what it sounds like or how it night feel but I want to sing something that's honest and real.
