## Easter greetings, Easter rejoicing



In *Matthew 28* Jesus meets the women who were visiting the tomb, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary in the garden with the word, "Greetings". This could be translated as hail or even rejoice. The women were already stunned by angels giving them the amazing message, "He is not here, He has risen", and they were now running to tell the disciples they had met Jesus. A time of fear, grief, and now shock, becomes a time of rejoicing.

A few weeks ago, Arsenal Football Club won a home Premier League match on virtually the last kick of the match, 9 minutes into extra time, against Bournemouth. The fans, players, management, reserves all went into incredible celebration, real rejoicing, something that could not be contained, hopes incredibly fulfilled! So big was the celebration and

rejoicing, that in some newspapers it was reported the Football Association were going to look into it!

If winning a football match causes such an incredible outpouring of rejoicing, how much more have we to rejoice about in the Christian Faith – Jesus Christ has Risen from the dead!

We live in a difficult time of uncertainty, with war in Ukraine, nations grouping together, global warming and possibly an economic banking crisis on the horizon. But as the hymn *Great Is Thy Faithfulness* states in the final verse:

"the Lord gives strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow".

The strength comes from the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead releasing strength and joy into the lives of those who welcome Jesus in. In *Philippians 3:10* St Paul states:

"I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the power of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death."

This Easter, let's truly know that "rejoicing" is not only over human things like football matches, but even more over Jesus' resurrection from the dead! As we come up to Easter, it's been a sad time of loss of long-term church members. We pray for their families who grieve. However, our loss is heaven's gain because Jesus has risen from the dead.

This afternoon I prayed with someone who has only a couple of days to live. It was a powerful conversation with someone who has faith. Jesus was very present with us, the Lord was waiting to welcome this person home.

The challenge of Easter is to live in the power of the Resurrection of Jesus, thereby receiving spiritual strength for today and a bright hope for tomorrow beyond the grave.

Hallelujah! Christ is Risen!

He is Risen indeed, Hallelujah!

I look forward to celebrating with many of you this Holy Week and Easter.





#### C S Lewis and The Chronicles of Narnia

Later this year in November will be the 60th anniversary of the death of CS Lewis. He died on the same day John F Kennedy was shot.

However, March this year was the 62nd anniversary of a letter Lewis wrote explaining the allegory in his series of seven books. The Chronicles of Narnia. The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe was first published in 1950. The girl (Anne Waller) to whom he wrote this letter was born in the same year as that book was released.

For those who only know of Lewis through these works, written so that children can enjoy them, it may come as a surprise to learn that he was an incredibly intelligent, learned and eminent academic. For the last nine years of his life he held the Chair of Medieval and Renaissance Literature at Magdalene College Cambridge, previously he had been at Magdalen College Oxford (and yes, the two universities do have different spellings for that college name). Lewis received many accolades during his lifetime but he declined the appointment to the Order of the British Empire.

So coming back to the explanation of the books, what did he write to that 11 year-old girl as a partial response to her question? He says he imagined a world of talking beasts that, like ours, had gone wrong. He wondered how Christ would enter such a world and the chronicles are the answer.

"The whole series works out like this:

The Magician's Nephew tells the creation and how evil

entered Narnia.

The Lion etc. the crucifixion and resurrection. restoration of the true religion after Prince Caspian

a corruption.

The Horse and his Boy the calling and conversion of a heathen. The Voyage of the Dawn Treader the spiritual life (especially in

Reepicheep).

The Silver Chair the continued war against the

powers of darkness.

The Last Battle the coming of the Antichrist (the

ape). The end of the world and the

Last Judgement.

All clear?"





#### News from some of our Mission Partners



#### Dear friends,

It was a mixed start to the term, with some challenges but lots of encouragements, many of which came from unexpected places! Over the past term, it has been a joy to come alongside some students from the University of Cumbria, as well as supporting the Lancaster University Christian Union in their events week.

This term has continued to be a challenge in terms of the numbers of students attending events, but there have been plenty of opportunities to get alongside the students that have come along to our events. One thing that has been really encouraging has been the increased contact with students from the University of Cumbria, especially since so many of our events happen on Lancaster University campus! A German international student came along to a walk last term and since then has been enthusiastically telling other international students about our activities: at our pancake event, she brought four more students from the University of Cumbria, who came from Afghanistan, Pakistan, India

and Taiwan. Please do be praying particularly for this German student, who we have recently discovered lives with a Christian and has visited a local church during her time in Lancaster. As she draws into her final few months of studying, please pray that we and her flatmate would be able to challenge her to think more deeply about what Christians believe and that she would come to know Jesus!

I also had the privilege of taking a group of students to Kendal. We had a great afternoon exploring the town together, walking around the castle (see photo), and introducing some of the group to carrot cake for the first time! It was great to see students from the University of Cumbria and Lancaster University mixing,



and I was encouraged by the opportunities that came up naturally to share my faith and the reason that I am doing my job!

During Lancaster University Christian Union's events week, I was able to support the students as they sought to share the good news of Jesus on campus. It was great to see many international students coming into the events through the week, and I was particularly encouraged by the fact that students I had met at Friends International, church, or chaplaincy events had come along and were getting to know more Christians as a result.

As some of you may be aware, I was due to take a sabbatical last year after having worked for Friends International for seven years. However, for a number of reasons I made the decision to postpone it, with the agreement of my supervisor and others at Friends International. With the ministry in Lancaster in a stronger position this year and our Staff Worker, Skyler, having completed his first year, the timing feels right for me to be able to take a step back and take my sabbatical over the summer term this year.

My sabbatical will be for three months, running from Monday 3rd April to Friday 30th June. I will be primarily based in Lancaster for April and May, with visits to other Friends International centres around the country to see how international student ministry happens in other places. In addition, I will be visiting a supporting church for a Mission Sunday. When I am not visiting other places during this time, I will be studying some resources which may be helpful in our future ministry to international students in Lancaster.

In June, I am planning to be outside the UK. I will be attending the Leadership Matters course taking place in the Philippines between 18th and 28th June and am hoping to tie this in with a visit to friends or former students overseas.

#### **Around the North West**

As a North-West Cluster, some of us had the privilege of meeting together in person at the recent Friends International January Conference, spending some time sharing how our previous term had been as we reached out to international students in our different cities and praying for each other.

One particular prayer point from around the North West comes from Manchester: over the past year, one of our Staff Workers in Manchester, Harmienke, has been working hard to establish a Globe

Café at Salford University, a university which had 4,325 international students in 2021/22. Despite enthusiasm from the international students and a dedicated volunteer team, it has been an uphill battle as they have consistently found themselves unable to book rooms consistently and now are unable to meet on the campus. The great encouragement through all of this is that there has been a group of international students who have shown up to the Café wherever it has been, even on weeks when the venue has had to change at the last minute to be somewhere far away from the campus.

- Please give thanks for our busy events programme through the term and all the students we have got to know, particularly for the group of students from the University of Cumbria who have been coming to our Lancaster University outings and International Corner.
- Please pray for wisdom in the face of our weekly Conversation Café launched at the end of January being very low on numbers.
- Please pray for Harmienke and the Globe Café team in Manchester as they try to build relationships and share the gospel with international students in Salford in the midst of trying to find a permanent home for the Café.
- Please pray for my sabbatical. Please pray particularly for plans for June to come together quickly and that I would be able to use my time abroad usefully. Please pray that my sabbatical would be a time of refreshment and an opportunity to think through how we can better reach international students in Lancaster. Please pray too for Skyler as he builds on contacts and relationships and runs events while I am on my sabbatical.

#### Dear friends,

In mid March, the President of Malawi, Lazarus Chakwera, announced 14 days of national mourning following Cyclone Freddy. It is the Southern Region (which includes Blantyre) that has been most affected. Malawi's Department of Disaster Management Affairs published figures on 17th March:

- 345,183 people displaced,
- 505 camps established,
- 438 deaths.
- 918 injured and
- 282 people still missing.

It is likely that these figures will continue to rise. Some have chosen to stay in the ruins of their houses, others are being accommodated in relief camps based in schools.

Schools in the most affected districts remain closed for pupils until April. Other than those being used as camps, many schools were damaged and are structurally unsafe, and for some the authorities fear that pupils cannot safely get to school because of damaged roads and bridges. Using lessons learned from Covid, the national radio will be broadcasting classes.

Electricity and water supplies continue to be intermittent, although the authorities are working hard to restore these.

Cholera is a big concern, as Malawi was already experiencing a widespread cholera outbreak. In Blantyre even before Freddy we had

around 10 hours without electricity each day due to the ongoing effects of damage to the hydroelectric power plants by Cyclone Ana in January last year.

I went to church yesterday and talked with people there about how they are. Many say that their houses are still very vulnerable, with saturated mud brick walls. They fear too much sun, which would dry out the mud too quickly, leading to cracking and collapse. The church has approximately 60 families, and 13 of those have had major damage to their houses. It's amazing to see their incredible

resilience in spite of all that has happened. Yet many have questions: why did God allow this to happen?

#### Please continue to pray:

- For the church to reach out with God's love and compassion. Give thanks for many churches already doing this.
- For those who have been devastated by the effects of the cyclone to receive practical help and to come to know God's comfort, and to know that he is the only Rock and Refuge.
- For coordination between government and relief agencies, and for the distribution of assistance to those most in need. Pray against corruption.
- For the rebuilding of houses, repair of schools, and replacement of broken infrastructure roads, bridges, electricity, water.

It will take a long time for things to return to anything like normal, and many people will need support over the long term. A message from SIM Malawi's director concerning its response to this disaster is given on the next page.

In this update we'd like to introduce some people connected to the church who are struggling in different ways. Please pray with us for them.

#### Young men and suicide

Suicide is very common in Japan. One of our regular Christian young men was deeply affected by the suicide of a colleague some years ago and had to leave a good job because of it. Another non-Christian friend has had mental health difficulties and has struggled to hold down a job since a family member killed himself. As we, as a church, try to encourage and reach out to young men like this, **please pray** for wisdom and grace for us.

#### Trouble at work

Recently, one church member ran into difficultly when they had to isolate because of Covid so couldn't go to work. Another Christian was bullied because, every time he went to visit family near Tokyo, colleagues would say he was "bringing Corona into the office". Another church member was falsely accused of making a mistake at work. These things could happen to anyone but **please pray** that, as Christians, our church members can be bold witnesses through the way they respond to these situations showing grace and love.

#### **Exams**

Grace and Isaac's exams begin in May. **Praise God** for the provision of lots of good places in Tokyo for them to stay during their exam time. **Please pray** for good concentration and hard work during revision time and for results that reflect their ability and hard work.

## **Church in a Changing World**

What is the Spirit saying to the Church at this significant moment in history?

Some personal thoughts from the Harrogate New Wine National Leadership Conference 2023 National Leadership Conference

Being recently retired has its benefits! This year I was able to join most of our church staff team at the New Wine leaders' conference held in Harrogate. The first worship session on the first afternoon was incredible – 1800 people committed to the Lord and worshipping Him in a big auditorium. The highlight for me was when the music faded and all those people continued softly singing and worshipping and there was an almost tangible presence of God in the place.

Paul Harcourt who is stepping down as National Leader, led the keynote talk, based on *Isaiah 43*:

"Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. <sup>19</sup> See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland."

In a world of turmoil, he reminded us that even though we don't know how things will be in the future, God knows the beginning and the end, He is in charge, He holds all things together. Holding onto the unchanging nature of God is a sure anchor for our lives. It is also the source of joy. He is doing a new thing with us, His Church. It could be that coming to the end of our own resources is the best thing that could ever happen to us, the new season is about rediscovering God's sufficiency. It's remembering God's holiness, His faithfulness, His glory, and majesty.

"We might again tremble at his word, be pierced by the awareness of our own sin, and be moved by genuine and sacrificial love."

Jill Duff, Bishop of Lancaster, basing her talk on *Psalm 24*, identified two barriers (ancient doors) to the entry of the King of glory in our lives – Repentance and Pain.

"Who may ascend the mountain of the Lord? Who may stand in his holy place? <sup>4</sup> The one who has clean hands and a pure heart, who does not trust in an idol or swear by a false god."

" <sup>7</sup> Lift up your heads, you gates; be lifted up, you ancient doors, that the King of glory may come in."

Repentance comes when the Spirit shines His light and reveals our sin. But repentance is a joyful experience! Look at how Zacchaeus throws a party when he repents! Look at the Samaritan woman who runs to tell everyone when she repents! It's like a ship that is lost and how the sailors rejoice when they turn around and see the lighthouse guiding them to safe harbour.

Jill compared sin to shards of broken glass that get mixed in us and are hard to separate; we need God to pick them out gently and unravel them. She named the shards as PRIDE – when we need Faith, DESPAIR – when we need Hope, and JUDGING – when we need to Love.

I was most struck by what she said about Pain. There are many in our Church who are experiencing pain right now, and for whom it is a hard time. Jill told of how the disciples on seeing the empty tomb gave up and went back to where they were staying, going back to work to keep busy. Mary stayed with the pain by the empty tomb, and that was when she saw two angels, and that was when she met Jesus.

There will be pain, Jesus suffered on the cross and calls us to share in His suffering. By saying yes to enduring the cross with Jesus, our faith can grow, whilst our pain is tenderly held within the will of God knowing what each of us can bear. How overjoyed we will then be when glory comes.

Jill spoke of Jean Darnall's vision in 1967 of the British Isles lit all over by fiery beacons, lit to carry a message. God is penetrating the darkness with His power, strategically placing us to be His lights everywhere so no one will be without a witness. I think this resonates with the vision of St Luke's lifeboats, going into the stormy seas from the bright lighthouse to witness and rescue where he leads us.

John McGinley spoke from his book *The Church of Tomorrow – being a Christ centred people in a changing world*. He named the church of the past as the Collaborating Majority, where everyone in the land called themselves Christian. This has led us to a distorted relationship with the world, a mixing with the culture of the world that does not allow for us to bear the pain that the world may hate us as it hated Jesus. John calls this the Conflicted Middle.

But there is good news!

"The Church emerging into our culture of uncertainty is alive and dynamic, diverse, Spirit-filled, more confident in the gospel and in calling, equipping and sending people to make disciples in all nations."

We are to be the Creative Minority, that is to stay in the world, but stay true to the faith. We are not friends with the world, Jesus is Lord. Numbers are not as important as making disciples. We cannot do this in our own strength but by being wholly dependent on the power of God working in us through the Holy Spirit. The Church of England has a vision to plant 10,000 new churches in the next 10 years, to reach new people, in new places, in new ways. How amazing would it be to be a part of that!

This is just a snapshot of the three days — I went to seminars and workshops, browsed the resources and organisations area and talked to many exhibiting there. I have come away with many of my own ideas, some pictures and thoughts that may have been given by God, but above all a new peace, and a renewed hope and energy to keep going. The Church is not dead, God is doing a new thing with us!

"I remain confident of this: I will see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living. Wait for the Lord; be strong and take heart and wait for the Lord."

## **World Day of Prayer**

"I have heard about your faith" Ephesians 1:15-19



Chatting to a friend last month, I discovered that their way of preparing for the World Day of Prayer is to meet together a few weeks beforehand and plan their event. Not so in Watford! It took almost a year of planning — attendance at the National Link Day at St Martin's in the Fields in July, holding the Regional Preparation Day in November and taking an afternoon to study the Bible passage from *Ephesians* in February — all this in order to be ready for the main event on Friday 3rd March 2023.

The Watford committee members have variously surmounted the challenges of bereavement, illness, caring duties and a house move so we were pleased to welcome two new members to replace the five who could no longer help. The 11 of us came from six different Watford churches, both Anglican and Free Church. It is the responsibility of the host church (this year St Luke's) to take the lead through the year.

On the afternoon of the service, it was encouraging for the host team to be joined by helpers from previous years, including Lorna. Our Mayor, Peter Taylor, joined us, as did our MP, Dean Russell, whose morning had been spent in the House of Lords hearing amendments to his Private Members' Bill.

This year's service was written by an ecumenical group of ladies from

Taiwan. They had overcome church divisions within Taiwan and the start of the Covid-19 pandemic to send us a message of encouragement. Only 6.6% of Taiwan's 23 million population is Christian. Many in Taiwan follow a mixture of Buddhism, Confucianism, Daoism and traditional religion.

The postcard pictured was painted by Hui-Wen Hsaio and shows women praying silently and looking up into the dark. Despite the uncertainty of the path ahead, they know that the salvation of Christ has come. Two endangered species, the Mikado



pheasant and the Black-faced spoonbill are featured. They have unique significance to the Taiwanese. The green grass represents the Taiwanese as simple, confident and strong and under God's care. The Phalaenopsis (butterfly orchids) are the pride of Taiwan, the Kingdom of Orchids.

We can continue to pray for their country: it remains unrecognised by the United Nations and the political tensions with mainland China are increasing.

Afterwards there was plenty of time to chat and reconnect with others over refreshments.

Thank you to all the St Luke's folk who helped us at the service and throughout the year, especially Jeremy Cooke, Pam Norman, Tim Whittaker, Beth Burns and Susan Miller's Lifegroup.

Next year's service, on Friday 1st March 2024, has been written by the Christian ladies of Palestine – another interesting and concerning part of the world. Please keep them in your prayers.





