## Laughter



Heavy rain in our house always sets us chortling, mainly due to my lovely daughter's comments about 'chuckling it down' and referring to pouring rain as 'poor old rain'. I simply love the fact that now as we mop up the frustrating leaks in the conservatory or battle sodden through a torrential downpour, humour breaks through. As Victor Hugo once said 'laughter drives winter from the human face'.

On occasion you might read the Bible and find it to be all a bit serious, but increasingly I wonder about the underlying humour in the tone of certain phrases when set in their original context. Whilst the Bible is clear that Jesus wept at the grave of Lazarus, nowhere does it expressly mention that he laughed, but that does not mean he was always straight-laced and serious. Let's take a quick look and examine the evidence shall we, as I think that even beyond the creation of the platypus, the Venezuelan poodle moth or the naked mole rat, God has a great sense of humour.

Let's start with some *irony*. The book of Jonah is full of it. We see the prophet running at pace in the opposite direction God told him to go, but ultimately even after Jonah's half-hearted delivery and the super-

sulk that follows, the Ninivites eagerly accept God's message! Elderly Sarah laughing out loud in *Genesis 18* when she is told she will conceive is another notable comic moment. There is also no doubt that Jesus recognised irony and was not afraid to call it out. The religious leaders of the day constantly failed to treat other people with dignity and respect, and seemed more concerned about impressing God by ensuring every detail of ceremony was perfect. Jesus' opening comments in *Matthew 23* about blind guides seeking to strain out gnats whilst swallowing camels would have surely brought a smile to the faces of the assembled, and grabbed their attention. In short, Jesus delivered a great comedy starter before he took the criticism to a deeper level.

There's also a fair bit of **absurdity** in the Bible too. How about Balaam and the donkey that God enabled to talk in *Numbers 22:28-30*, or the ill-fated boys who started calling Elisha 'baldy' in *2 Kings 2:23-24*. Whilst these two incidents highlight the need for respect, they also show us that sometimes we are so stubborn that God has to do out-of-the-ordinary things to get our attention!

Whilst there is not much *sarcasm* in the Bible, Elijah was certainly adept. In *1 Kings 18:27* a group of pagan worshippers challenged the prophet of God to see whose deity could perform the best miracle. The worshippers got no response even after a good few hours of shouting and dancing, so Elijah suggested their god had to be asleep or on holiday! These sort of comments could only come from a prophet who was utterly certain of the superior power of the God he worshipped!

There are a good few *pranks* in the Bible too. In *1 Samuel 5:1-5* the Philistines who opposed Israel captured the key artefact that symbolised God's presence – the Ark of the Covenant – and placed it in a temple in Ashdod devoted to a pagan god Dagon. Twice the pagan idol fell face down before the Ark – yes twice – and the second time the idol's head and hands broke off. Who says God has no sense of humour? You also get the occasional moment of *dark humour* such as Paul's epic sermon which bores poor Eutychus literally to death in *Acts 20*! All ends well when Eutychus is miraculously raised to life again.

Finally, Jesus also almost certainly used *hyberbole*. I wonder if his comedy exaggerations in *Luke 6:41-42* concerning ocular specks of dust and the planks in others' eyes, would have made the difficult teaching regarding putting your own house in order before criticising others easier to swallow. Again in *Matthew 19:23-24* he used hyperbole to explain how difficult it is for people to trust Him instead of their wealth.

So there we go, some great humorous moments. And we haven't even mentioned the streaker in *Mark 14*, or the moment Jesus got 'hangry' in *Mark 12*!

Whilst the Bible may not be equivalent to a 'laugh out loud' joke book, there are many moments of real humour. Christ and comedy, jokes and Jesus are not mutually exclusive. It is clear that we do need to be wise about the way we jest and how often, as all of these examples highlight that context really does matter! We are reminded in *Ecclesiastes 3:4*, 'there is a time for laughter and a time for seriousness', and in *Ephesians 5:4* that humour is great but should never be taken too far.

But with that caveat applied, let us seek out the holy humour in scripture, and apply funny faith to our everyday lives, understanding that, used well, it 'is like medicine for our souls' (*Proverbs 17:22*) but also because (as Jesus was acutely aware) humour can be a doorway to understanding and accessing much deeper spiritual truths.

The Alban Pilgrimage is organised by St Albans Cathedral to celebrate one of the greatest stories in the Christian faith. Each year, 12 ft tall carnival puppets, representing figures from the story of St Alban, re-enact Alban's life and matryrdom through the streets of St Albans. The puppets are accompanied by people



of all ages dressed as lions, Roman soldiers, angels, chariots and more, resulting in a stunning spectacle of colour and celebration.

Celebrations will be taking place throughout the day and all are welcome.

### News from some of our Mission Partners



#### Dear friends,

Welcome to a Cyclone Freddy update! Many of you have been in contact because of Freddy, which hit Malawi in mid-March. THANK YOU so much for praying and giving to SIM's relief appeal. I thought it would be good to devote this newsletter to an update of the situation.

#### What happened?

Over a 5-day period someone from the Wildlife Society who lives quite near to me recorded 587 mm (over 23 inches) of rainfall in his garden. His daily, monthly and annual records, kept for more than 25 years, were broken by Freddy.

In Blantyre, where townships are built on hillsides, mudslides swept away houses and their occupants. It is likely that the final death toll will be over 1,000. From my house I can see one of the hills, now with large scars. Many houses in Blantyre townships are built out of mud



bricks rather than stronger burnt bricks. Walls were saturated and many collapsed. South from Blantyre is the wide, flat floodplain of the River Shire. Here, people suffered from widespread flooding which destroyed both houses and crops.

People are remarkably resilient and are rebuilding their lives, though it will take longer to heal the emotional scars. My pastor has moved back into his house as the wall that collapsed has been rebuilt. Electricity and water supplies are now much better than they were, and work is continuing to mend roads and bridges.

## What is happening with the relief programme?

SIM, together with our partners, the Africa Evangelical Church (AEC) and the Evangelical Association of Malawi (EAM), raised money for relief programmes. I took part in a distribution run by the AEC. They

hired a truck to carry items for 275 households; for each household: 25 kg of maize flour, some beans, salt, a blanket and a mosquito net. We're so thankful for your generous giving which made this possible!

Together with a colleague and leaders from the AEC, we left at 6 am for the 4-hour drive to Nsanie district. A few miles north of Nsanje we stopped at Tengani, where there is an AEC church. Next to the church is the church-owned Mpatsa Primary School. The local pastor, Alfred Banda (a former student of mine), showed us around. The school, for 3850 pupils (including 12 blind students who live on site), was flooded by a seasonal river which broke its banks. The school has been flooded before. but the scale this time was unimaginable. The site is dry



now but the water has left behind tonnes of silt. Many buildings are half-buried; the borehole was completely buried. Wonderfully, no lives were lost, and the AEC is now in talks with the government and community about relocating the school. For now, teaching is taking place in tents donated by UNICEF and under trees.

We travelled on to Khulubvi camp, a few miles south of Nsanje. I was impressed by the organisation. Within a few minutes of our arrival, the truck arrived, and a few items were unloaded. People from the camp gathered and sat on the ground under trees, and soon the ceremony was ready to begin. As is usual here, there were several speeches – from the village chief, the government representative, the church head, and the AEC projects' consultant. Then the local pastor, Elard Tsilizani (another former student) brought encouragement from *Matthew 11:28-30*. He spoke of Jesus understanding our burdens and our suffering and inviting us to come to him. Official photographs were

taken of the giving of items to the first recipient – I was asked to represent SIM alongside the head of the church, the projects' consultant and the government representative. 108 households at Khulubvi camp received items.

During the distribution, I took the opportunity to listen to people and encourage them with God's love. One lady described



how she'd woken up at 2 am on 13th March, finding that her feet felt cold. She realised that it was water. Soon the air was filled with the sound of people shouting, a bell ringing and frantic running. All were saved, taking refuge in a local classroom. Yet they lost everything: houses, possessions, livestock and crops in the field. Pastor Tsilizani explained to me how the people in this area are hard workers, growing sugar cane, rice and beans. All gone.

The next day the AEC went on to a different camp, and went back to Mpatsa to give to families there. Other distributions through AEC and EAM will take place in the coming weeks.

## What other opportunities have come about?

As I've listened to people over the last month I've been struck by different reactions. I wonder how you would react to losing your house and possessions? Some have praised God that they are still alive. Some have voiced their questions to God, while others have held back, thinking that to ask questions would be a sin. Some have wondered what they need to do so that God will have mercy on them. Some have simply clung to him. Some have turned to African Traditional Religions, making sacrifices to appease the spirits.

I am very grateful that God has opened up various opportunities for me. On the Sunday after Freddy I preached from *Psalm 22*, talking about lament and pointing the congregation to the Lord Jesus and His suffering for us on the cross. Over Easter I visited the Wheatleys and led a Bible study with the pastors and their wives in the Lakeshore area, contrasting traditional reactions to disaster with faith-filled ones.

It was a delight to meet with three former colleagues and start a discussion with them about thinking Biblically about disasters and suffering. We plan to prepare some resources that they can use in pastors' fraternals and other gatherings to help pastors think Biblically. I've been invited to have a similar discussion with the lecturers at the Evangelical Bible College of Malawi.



We have much to be thankful for:

- **Expat retreat** we're so grateful for Jan, our All Nations friend and colleague, for her Spirit-inspired teaching on the ups and downs of the life of Peter which was both challenging and encouraging.
- **Opportunities to meet in person** we've said this before, and will say it again... there's no substitute for actually meeting with people

- face-to-face (though we are enormously thankful for all that can be done through the internet!).
- Time on the Terai (border with India) we had a very fruitful visit to a selection of INF's Self Help Groups (the main conduit for community health and development work). Hearing the groups share about the reduction in domestic violence and human trafficking was very encouraging, as was seeing the very clear confidence and enthusiasm that group members have developed since getting together.
- **Ethical/photo storytelling** this side of Clive's work is developing apace with growing interest from different sectors.
- Mission training joining in with an All Nations 2-day intensive training event in Pokhara was a treat, especially since there's a possibility that four of the participants will apply for the remoteaccess Contextual Theology MTh! We thank God that we were able to be here at the same time and will potentially support the students in the future.
- Visa and finally... after a very long time of waiting (and completing
  a Masters), Andrea has an official visa! The Labour Department
  phone interview was relatively painless and the processing ran
  smoothly. Incredible! Although we can't be in Nepal for long periods
  at this time, an official visa does give both of us more flexibility...
  and the ability to officially work in the INF office when in-country.

**Timings** - the current arrangement with our timings in Nepal vs UK is very tiring but is valuable for continuity on 'both sides' - the balance is the best we can do for the season we're in.

## **Hope Leadership Conference 2023**

Unlike most people enjoying the sun on Bank Holiday Monday 1st May, I spent mine at the Leadership Conference with over 5000 other church leaders. This is the annual Holy Trinity Brompton Church Leadership Conference — a 2-day conference at the Royal Albert Hall in West London.

It was beautiful and affirming to see many Christian leaders from different denominations praying and worshipping together, a taste of what Jesus prayed for, that we may be united in his name.

There were many notable speakers but I was struck most by the Vulnerability and Hope in the people present.

#### Vulnerability

There were pockets of conversations with various church leaders recognising the uncertainty of life; there is no new normal. Life is uncertain; 'being' church no longer has the traditional structures that felt safe and worked.

It feels like we are in a period akin to Holy Saturday, where the disciples waited, uncertain whether there would be a resurrection. Yet, they could not deny the experience of God in the person of Jesus had been amongst them.

We know what it feels like to have dynamic worshipping communities — we have experienced the Spirit of God amongst us. And yet we now face a crisis where the way we did discipleship, mission and evangelism no longer seems to work. And the detractors ask, "Where is their God?"

## Hope

Our God is here with us. He promised He would not leave nor forsake us. He promised that He would be there when we feel shaken on every side. That was the hope I felt at the conference. The structures and the



'how to be' church may change but our hope remains because God is with us. Holy Saturday does turn into Easter Sunday. We have the risen Christ, who works magnificently in uncertain times.

So, we are not in denial of the realities of life; we are sharing and carrying each other's vulnerabilities. Our finances are stretched, our free time is occupied with taking on more paid work, and we may feel overwhelmed about what more we can bear. And yet we hold on to Christ, our redeemer and intercessor, who gave Himself for the hope set before Him. We carry that same hope in us that all will be well. We hope to be the beacon and lighthouse for our parish.



Dear St Luke's family, may I encourage you to share vulnerably with others and to carry each other's burdens – be honest about your fears. God is in the midst of those who gather in His name. And remember that when we share vulnerably with each other, we 'stand in the gap' for others because we place the burdens before Jesus, our Redeemer. We are not called to shoulder the worries and anxieties but to bring them before the God of Hope.




