

And when the Chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory that will never fade away."

We are all called to be servants of Christ, to set aside our personal rights

in order to love, serve and obey the will of God in Christ Jesus. Jesus gave us instructions in His Word, and the more we read and learn, the better we do. We do our work humbly and with love. We believe the hardships and struggles we face while in the flesh will be far outmatched by the glory and reward awaiting us in Heaven.

We have many examples of faithful servants for Christ in our church family who have recently been taken up to heaven, our dear Jack Watson being one. It is apparent from the outpouring of sadness and memories from those of all ages just how many this servant of the Lord impacted. He had a vast knowledge of, and firm belief in, Scripture and he desired for it to be available to all, through the Gideons, through daily scripture notes, through the Watford Schools Trust and as a leader of Junior Crusaders where I first met him, as well as supporting church youth groups. My daughters said, "He was always interested in us, wanting to know how we were doing and conversations with him were always an encouragement. He was lovely."

I can imagine Jack receiving the crown of glory that never fades, and hearing Christ saying "Well done, good and faithful servant.... Enter into the joy of your Master!" (*Matthew 25:21*).

We are not perfect and throughout the Bible God seems to use those who mess up time and again, but the overriding motivation is our love for Jesus, and therefore our desire to care for one another. Time is short in the busy world of work and family pressures but Jesus calls us all to serve, young children as well as the oldest among us. We have young teenagers volunteering with Holiday Club and playing in the worship band. We have retirees who give an amazing amount of time and energy in service, and we have everyone in between! Jesus said, "By this, everyone will know that you all are my disciples, if you have love one for another." (John 13:35).

Have you picked up one of our leaflets listing all the opportunities there are to serve at St Luke's? We have an immediate need for a PCC Secretary. The PCC Secretary works with the Chair of the PCC to ensure decision making is clearly and accurately recorded and that all the documents for the meeting are available. There are 5-6 PCC meetings a year. 
5:30pm Encounter - Informal Evening Service

Christian Aid Week 2023

I wish to thank the people who delivered and collected envelopes for Christian Aid Week in May. Together with a church collection, we achieved a total of £1012.56. This is lower than previous years for a few reasons, including cash is not used as much and online giving is not accounted for in the total.



On 16th June I attended a meeting at Christian Aid headquarters in Lower Marsh, London, to meet with other Christian Aid representatives and to hear reports from the experts in various fields.

Richard told us how Cyclone Freddy had devastated crops and homes in Malawi in February and March this year. We learnt how pigeon peas were being planted because they are a drought-resistant crop and have long roots which can survive some stormy weather.

Pigeon peas are a staple food crop that provide good protein. They can be used like fresh peas or dried like any other peas, beans or lentils. In India they are one of the most popular pulses. Dhal is made from pigeon peas. They can also be sprouted to make them even more nutritious, and they can be ground into flour.

Before the Russian invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, there was no Christian Aid presence in Europe. A young Ukrainian woman has now joined the team in London and spoke about how Christian Aid is working with partners in evacuation, mobile health support and other practical help in Ukraine and border areas of Hungary and Romania.

Since the destruction of the Nova Kakhovka dam, the Ukrainian authorities say at least 37 towns and villages have been flooded and 16,000 people have lost their homes. The full impact of rising water along both sides of the frontline Dnipro river has yet to be seen but the United Nations fears it could be an environmental disaster.

As one of the members of the Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC), Christian Aid worked with partners on the ground after the earthquakes in Turkey in February this year to provide shelter, winter kits, food and clean water. Christian Aid has been working with local

partners across Syria for decades, responding to the Syrian crisis since 2012. It was among the first responders when the earthquakes struck and has been working with locally led relief efforts in northwest Syria.

Finally, Mohamad spoke about the new initiative being promoted by Christian Aid and other churches, called Faith Will. Gifts in Wills are a way for congregations to let their faith live on by leaving a gift in their Will to Christian Aid which could fund projects such as helping farming communities thrive in Zimbabwe.

Finance Update from St Luke's Treasurer

It is now over 6 months since I took on responsibility to serve you as Treasurer. I am grateful to the rest of the finance team for their faithful service.

This year is a year of transition for me as I learn how the finance works. John Sills' help with this handover is much appreciated.

A few aspects of interest:

1. Giving


Please be aware that we incur fees on cash and contactless reader transactions. These attract fees of about 1.5%. So, when giving, please could you send the money online which is generally free. Add your name to the reference. Happily, many people do this already either as a standing order or as one-off payments for which we are most grateful.

2. Card reader/contactless payments

In preference to cash, we have been making the card reader available at services and other events.

The steps to using the reader are:

1 If the display is not showing, **press** the button on the side on the right near the top. The reader should then light up:




- 2 **Type** in the sum of money you are giving
- 3 See the note on the next page if you can gift aid the money
- 4 **Press** 'Charge' button at the bottom of the screen. It will then show you the contact sign once it has linked up with the internet
- 5 **Tap** your contactless card or insert it in the slot at the top
- 6 It should then accept the payment and will confirm acceptance

Note to step 3: If you can gift aid the donation and have already registered this with John Sills then **select** 'Add description' and **type** in your first initial followed by your surname and then the words 'Gift Aid', eg 'J Brown Gift Aid'. If you forget to do this you can email John Sills at john.sills5@gmail.com confirming payment details (how much and when).

3. Your money: What do we do with it?

This is a breakdown of how every pound of your donation is spent:

If you are a taxpayer your pound can be increased by 25% with Gift Aid. Please speak to John Sills if you have not signed a St Luke's gift aid form. **Note:** The Partners in Mission group manages the charities share out.

4. This year

I recall my predecessor, Paul Evans, talking a while ago about the fat years and the lean years. This is a lean year. It has not felt appropriate to raise an appeal for church funds this year (a year of rising inflation and still high business power costs) but it is important that you know the budget predicted a deficit of over £20k which will need to be met by our reserves.

News from some of our Mission Partners



Dear friends

I am back in the office in Lancaster after my 3-month sabbatical! The time has gone very quickly but I am excited to be back into the swing of things, especially as we plan ahead to the next academic year. I wanted to take the opportunity to fill you in on what I was doing over my sabbatical and how it has helped me to move forward in my ministry among international students.

The first two months of my sabbatical were spent mostly based in Lancaster, with trips to visit family and friends elsewhere in the UK, including a holiday in Cornwall. I was able to enjoy some rest and some time reading Christian books as well as casual reading.

One thing I had time set aside to do was to reflect on the past few years of ministry, and in particular the period of time coming out of Covid. In planning this time, I particularly wanted to think about how to better envision our team of volunteers and those who might be interested in being involved in international student ministry in the future. As I thought about this, I spoke to other Friends International staff about their experiences and was able to get some ideas and thoughts from them. It became clear that part of the wider problem we were having with growing our volunteer team lay also in our communication of the vision of international student ministry and so that is what I will be working on moving forward.

Also in May, I had the privilege of joining St Luke's for your Mission Sunday and meeting with many of you who have been praying for me in my work with Friends International for many years. It was a great opportunity to share the joy of international student ministry with the church and why students returning home has such an important role to play in the growth of the church around the world.

In June, I had the privilege of travelling to Hong Kong and the Philippines for the last part of my sabbatical. I spent the first few days of my trip in Hong Kong where I was able to meet up with some former students who have returned home. Although I was only able to stay in Hong Kong for a

short time due to flight delays, it was a joy to meet up with them and to hear how the past few years have been from their perspective.

I then flew from Hong Kong to Davao City in the Philippines for the Leadership Matters course, a course on Christ-centred leadership for those in cross-cultural ministry around the world. The course was a really helpful mixture of big picture aspects of ministry, such as maintaining our spiritual life and the vision for our ministry, and the practical elements of leadership training. From communicating with ministry partners, to developing deeper relationships, to delegating well, I came away feeling much better equipped than beforehand.

As well as the course itself, though, there was the great encouragement of meeting other participants involved in ministry from around the world and, in particular, from the Philippines. I thought I would share a couple of encouraging stories, highlighting some of their ministries:

Thyra works for a small Bible school which specifically works with Christians who come from tribal communities, training them theologically so that they can return to their tribes and share the good news of Jesus with their communities in their own language. Please do give thanks for the opportunity they have with two of their students at the moment who are from a tribe that is officially classed as 'unreached' and are committed to taking the gospel back to their community.

Ricardo, a minister responsible for several churches within a district, has set a goal of seeing 10 new churches planted throughout the district by 2030. Already, in answer to prayer, 4 new churches have been established, 4 small groups will be launching as churches in the next year and 2 more groups are in the beginning stages!

It was such an encouragement to be sharing and learning with all of the other participants and to be able to pray with them and for their ministries.

Vision

My priority as I returned to work was our upcoming Vision
Morning, which took place on
Saturday 15th July. We invited
local Christians to give thanks for
the past year of international

- Please give thanks for refreshment and re-focussing on the big picture of international student ministry from my sabbatical. Please pray that I would keep the vision of seeing the lives of international students transformed by the gospel as my motivation in all my work and that this would be the driving force in decisions being made about the upcoming year.
- Please pray for the follow-up from the Vision Morning on 15th July, especially that many Christians from Lancaster will want to be involved with sharing the good news of Jesus with international students.
- Please pray for wisdom as we plan for the coming year. Please give thanks for the outcome of important meetings with staff at both the University of Cumbria and Lancaster University and pray for lots of opportunities to come alongside international students in the new academic year and connect them with local churches.

Update from Alastair working for a Bible translation organisation

Dear all,

Hopefully you enjoyed last month which was apparently the warmest June on record in the UK although I find that a little hard to believe. For me, it was a particularly full month.

After learning some useful tips at the EMDC conference in Thailand in May, it has been good to put them into practice and complete a whole New Testament for a minority language in SE Asia. However, it did require a few iterations due to some extremely minor revisions. An apparently insignificant change can add an extra line of text — which might push some text containing a footnote onto another page — which can cause large blocks of white to appear in the rest of the book as the system tries to re-lay the pages through to the end. The solution is to shrink and expand paragraphs around the revisions to make them fit neatly on a page — a process which is quite time-consuming.

Using the same software and techniques, I have been able to typeset the book of *Luke* in a dialect of the language I have been working with for the last several years. Hopefully this will be printed soon as it is a slow process when not physically present with the locals. Speaking of whom, we are also working on further updates to the very successful songbook.

The Ancient Path (a booklet showing the ancient origins of Christianity) and Bible for Children (BFC) project work took a bit of a break due to the typesetting. For The Ancient Path, I am now developing a SE Asian version in the Bloom Library (a free internet-based library resource where anyone can add a book they have produced) but also trying to update the Google Play version when we found out that people with new phones can't install the app. This was notified by a couple who work with refugees who speak the language.

It was good to have a last-minute meeting in Staines with a couple who work with Sikhs, just before their flight to the Philippines. They are excited about the possibility of using *The Ancient Path* in their ministry using Punjabi so I demonstrated what could be done. Please pray that they can get the translation and we can make the app.

Just a handful of BFC stories have been added to the Bloom Library but it has been good to be able to demonstrate the booklets. At the beginning of the month, Youth with a Mission (YWAM) in Harpenden

(who I heard about in SE Asia!) held their first 'Together for the Bibleless' event, which will hopefully continue. In a way, it was a micro version of the EMDC conference in Thailand. I had heard that there was going to be Portuguese translation for some of the YWAM students so I made a few Portuguese BFC samples. At the welcome coffee,




I 'happened' to meet someone from Brazil and showed her my samples. She was very enthusiastic about them and asked if there were any in Turkish as her ministry is in Turkish. As it happens, I print a story each week for my parents' Turkish cleaning lady and I always print a spare. I had taken a pile of Turkish spares to the event so I was pleased to find a new home for them.

Something I learnt at the event: Which indigenous language in the UK does not have any Scripture? The answer is British Sign Language.

Dear PCC members of St Luke's Church, Watford

On behalf of the Trustees of the Rafiki Thabo Foundation, I would like to thank you so much for your recent generous donation of £500.

We are currently paying the school and college fees for over 300 children and young people who would otherwise not be able to continue with their education. We know this support is making a huge difference to each of those young lives in so many ways, but we are particularly delighted when we hear real, tangible stories of that difference when we receive responses to our annual impact survey from our current scholars and our graduates.

One story that has particularly stuck with me this year is Eleanor's. I first met Eleanor in 2015 when she was about to finish secondary school. We had supported her throughout secondary school as, tragically, she had lost both her parents when she was young and no one else could help to pay her school fees, let alone university fees. I remember her as quite a shy but intelligent girl, with a quiet determination and ambition to succeed. After I met her, we supported her to study towards a Bachelor of Agricultural Sciences &

Entrepreneurship and were delighted when she graduated in 2019. She is now working as an agro-dealer and also trains youth in building farming businesses.

That in itself is a huge impact – she now has a solid income and a great future career path. But last year, she married when she was ready to do so, and for love, rather than being forced into a marriage so her family could get a dowry payment as sadly happens to so many young women from poor families in Uganda.

Then this year she has had a beautiful baby boy. Her son's life opportunities will be so much better with an educated mum – he is statistically much more likely to be healthy as his parents will be more likely to be able to access the right healthcare for him; and he is much more likely to go to school. Thus, your support is not only having an
