Jesus and the Miraculous Catch of Fish



Jesus called out to the disciples, "Friends, haven't you any fish?" "No", they answered.

He said "Throw your net on the right side of the boat and you will find some."

When they did, they were unable to haul the net in because of the large number of fish.

John 21:5,6

It's great to be back after my study leave of over 3 months. My thanks to all who led services during that time, especially our guest celebrants, lan Pankhurst, Anne Lovegrove, Vanessa Kerswell and Philippa Maddox. But thanks also to all the home team, especially our Church Wardens, Susan and John, the staff, lay leaders of worship and many others.

The story of Jesus at the lake after His resurrection has lessons for us today.

• Often ministry can seem fruitless – the disciples fished all night and caught nothing! But fruit is nearby.

- As they fished, Jesus was there but they hadn't realised it. We need to discern that Jesus is with us.
- We need to hear Jesus speak into the situation. Notice he didn't say fish on the other side of the lake, but on the other side of the boat!
- The small change (a tweak!) led to a mighty catch of fish.
- Blessing comes from hearing Jesus speak and in obeying.

When a Vicar returns from study leave, there may be fear or expectancy that lots of change will come about. However, I believe that's not what God is saying, but rather to be listening to Him and to make small but God-inspired changes, and then blessing will come.

To see that blessing, firstly our Church life needs increasingly to be undergirded with prayer. It was very encouraging to have around 25 of us at our half-day of prayer in early September. But secondly, we need to be sensitive to the promptings of God – the listening ear – that bring these small but profound changes that will lead us to a mighty catch of fish!

The Autumn is going to be a busy time, needing to be carefully paced, but also an exciting time as we come to many special annual events, including the launch of our Alpha course on a new night – Thursday – from the end of September. Is this a tweak that will lead to even more blessing? Please pray and bring people along. Come yourself if you would like an inspiring refreshment in the Christian faith.

On 1st October we have our Harvest Festival family service at 10:30am, where donations of dry food will be given to New Hope (see advert on page 6) and the Food Bank and cash donations will be given to Tearfund.

On the weekend of 7/8th October, we have evangelist and teacher Revd Greg Downes coming to speak to us at our parish weekend which will be away at Hope Latimer on Saturday 7th and at home on Sunday 8th for our services and lunch together. There will be a special guest Encounter service at 5:30pm when we are encouraged to come with a friend to hear Greg. Please pray about who you can bring.

There will also be a Confirmation service led by Bishop Jane of Hertford on 12th November at 5:30pm. If anyone is interested in being confirmed please see me as soon as possible. There will be preparation sessions in October/early November.

May God guide you as we begin this Autumn season.

Cleaner Energy Working Group

Did you know that there is a working group at St Luke's who are trying to find ways of reducing the carbon emissions of the church building? This is being informed by guidance produced by the Church of England with the aim of making our church buildings much less polluting.



As we are often reminded, the church is more than just the building, it is us, the body of believers. Therefore, we also need to play our part to act as good stewards of God's world by reducing our own carbon emissions in the way we live. Many members sponsor children who live in countries already being affected by our emissions. Our children and grandchildren will soon be affected in the UK, by heat, possibly by bitter cold, by loss of crops and by overcrowding due to mass population movement.

Of course, the Bible does not address the issue of global warming, directly. But it does talk of self sacrifice, responding to a neighbour in need, not running after luxury and not fretting about food and clothing. Below are a few of the many Bible passages that require this of us.

Luke 3:11

[John] answered them, "Whoever has two tunics is to share with him who has none, and whoever has food is to do likewise."

James 2:14-17

What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead.

1 John 3:17

But if anyone has the world's goods and sees his brother in need, yet closes his heart against him, how does God's love abide in him?

My Study Leave - A Journey of Discovery

On the evening of Sunday 7th May, I headed off to our house in West Sussex to begin over three months away from the parish. The drive began a journey which saw me travel over 4000 miles: to conferences; on holiday touring the capitals of Great Britain and Ireland; to various weddings — one in Yorkshire, one in Bath, another at home in Watford. I slept in 16

different beds and visited 11 churches or Christian communities. There were struggles, sadness and good times as well. Through it God spoke, I believe, about things concerning my Christian discipleship and our life as a church. This is just a brief summary but I will unpack things over the months to come.

Rhythm and balance

It's easy to get out of rhythm in our Christian lives. I found it difficult to keep in rhythm in the last few months leading up to my study leave, with a busy time at Easter and other one-off services and events combined with going down with Covid in the second week after Easter and preparing the church for my absence. With God's help, everything came together. However, it took its toll: there was an urge to keep active so it was difficult to relax or stop, despite being exhausted. It

took a few weeks to unwind and to get into any rhythm. I came to appreciate a more structured week and a determination to pace my life when I returned.

Resilient discipleship

At a conference at Lee Abbey in Devon I heard Ian Paul, theologian and member of the Archbishops Council, speak about resilience. How important a theme that is for our present time – what with

Covid, climate change, the refugee crisis, the war in Ukraine and threatening situations growing against Christians around our world and at home, making us concerned for the future. However, Jesus, the one to come, speaks to us about a future beyond this world, in a world to come, and He says that in this life it won't always be easy. Resilience is called for and is clearly seen in the suffering

church of the early centuries of Christianity and also seen today, elsewhere in our world.

The importance of Sabbath

In early June, I attended a conference at Scargill House in Yorkshire. A beautiful setting and lovely weather led to a good week of ministry, receiving much. It was led by the warden of Scargill, Phil Stone, and Roy Searle from the Northumbrian Community. The phrase "the ruthless elimination of hurry", used by John Ortberg and the title of a book by John Mark Corner, both American pastors, spoke to all of us. The call to return to a true Sabbath, rather than a 'day off' was a real challenge, one you will hear more about over the next six months.

The Church as Community

This theme particularly came through to me when visiting Scargill, and also attending our daughter Jenni's church plant in Birmingham and

visiting a Celtic monastic site at Glendalough in Ireland set up by a major Irish saint, St Kevin. Even looking at the ruins of Glendalough, clearly it had been a place of community. How that applies to us will be prayed about and developed in the future.

The vital importance of God's presence with us

As I went from conference to conference, from one event to another, the importance of

recognising God's presence, God moments, actually knowing that God was speaking and feeling his presence in a tangible way, grew in importance. The question is how can we take His presence into our day-to-day lives? Again, that is connected with our spiritual daily rhythm and an intention to walk with the Lord and be aware of His presence.

So, that is a summary of some of

the major things God spoke to me about and I hope to unpack them in the weeks and months ahead. The visits to Sussex, Devon, Yorkshire, Kent, Wales, Ireland and Scotland made this a busy and, occasionally, a tough time, but also a time of much joy. My thanks go to all who prayed for me, to those who kindly gave money towards my study leave and to those who encouraged and protected that time away. Thank you.

News from some of our Mission Partners



Dear friends

The summer has flown by, and we are seeing our plans for the 2023/24 academic year coming together. As we reach the middle of September, I wanted to take some time to share how you can pray for me and Friends International Lancaster as we move into the start of the new academic year.

As I look ahead to the new academic year, it is with excitement — and some nervousness! One thing I have learnt over the past couple of years is that what our plans look like at the beginning of the academic year is often very different to the middle and the end of the year! God alone knows what the coming year will bring and which students He is already preparing for us to meet, so we pray that we will make good use of the opportunities He gives us.

One reflection that I had after my sabbatical was that we had not had sufficient focus on helping international students to engage with local churches. Moving into this new year, then, we have made some changes which we hope will lead to more students being connected with local Christians and, therefore, being invited into churches.

International Corner will be back, our social event for international

students. However, we have two major changes to the format!
Firstly, we will be meeting in one of the local churches in the city centre in order to connect with students who live off campus or attend the University of Cumbria, as well as making it easier for local church volunteers to attend.
Secondly, we will be including an optional, introductory Bible study at the end of the event to facilitate gospel-centred conversations between volunteers and students.

We will also be starting Local Link, our hospitality programme, from the start of the academic year rather than just over the Christmas break. As I met with Z a few weeks ago, a student from a Muslim-majority country who had benefitted from being connected with a local household that she is still in contact with, I was reminded of how important hospitality is for building relationships with international students. This has been our motivation in expanding our Local Link programme so that we can connect students with local Christian households from the start of their time in Lancaster. As they meet together two or three times a term, we pray that there will be natural opportunities for our Local Link hosts to share life and faith with their students.

One truth that I have been reminded of has been that this work is not our own, it is God's work and it is in God's strength that we are able to run these events. It was such an unexpected encouragement to see around 40 students attending our Drop-In Café recently, enjoying free tea, coffee and cake! The vast majority of these were from China, a demographic we have been praying that we would have opportunities to come alongside this year so this was a great answer to prayer. In God's kindness, despite the fact that we were short-staffed for this event, those that were there were able to spend some time chatting to students and they seemed keen to keep in contact. We pray that many of these students will now know who Friends International Lancaster is and will keep coming along to our events in the future!

Please pray for me and the Friends International Lancaster team as we facilitate these events! Please pray that many students will be invited into local churches and will hear the transforming news of Jesus!

staff understand the value of Friends International. Also give thanks for the opportunities I have had to share the vision of our ministry with others and please pray that we would see many Christians in Lancaster get excited about being involved with international student ministry.

- Pray for the Africa Evangelical Church, especially for the transition in leadership.



August was a puzzling month! This wasn't spending time doing puzzles but working on the latest New Testament typesetting, trying to find suitable solutions to the page layout. The translation team wants a font of a

particular size (larger is easier to read) and two columns on a page because that is what Bibles look like. However, the language has many long words which often means that only two words fit on a line in many places. If this happens on consecutive lines, large white 'holes' and 'rivers' can appear on a page. The puzzle has been to try and find a way around this.

At the end of July, a group of 26 from St Luke's attended the New Wine Christian Festival 2023, held at the Kent Event Centre in Detling, near Maidstone. A few of us camped but most of us, including myself, stayed off site in hotels and B&Bs.



New Wine has an extensive programme of activities, workshops and worship for families, individuals, children and youth.

On the first night, after dinner together, we all headed down to the massive main arena tent for welcoming, introductions, prayers, sermons and the amazing worship music. There was a large crèche and children's area at the back of the arena with volunteers on hand to look after the children while their parents joined in with the evening worship. Large screens to the sides and back were erected for those who couldn't see the stage properly. For me, with the great lighting and amazing sound, it was more like a rock concert atmosphere but with the presence of God.

During the evening the speaker encouraged anyone who wanted prayer to come forward to pray with the volunteer prayer team. The men prayed for the men and the women prayed for the women. All I can say is that receiving prayer in that environment is very powerful!

During the day, we were free to visit numerous venues in the village area to listen to talks on subjects such as Climate change, Persecution, The cost of living crisis, Transforming lives for good, Mental health, Faith and evangelism, Sexuality, Answering tough questions about your faith and my favourite: How to talk about Jesus without sounding weird! Each talk considered how these subjects affect us as Christians in today's world. Most talks ended with a Q&A session.

What I got out of New Wine was deep spiritual nourishment which has strengthened me and put me on the next path of my journey of faith. I would say New Wine has been a Christian crash course which I feel has

propelled me forward in learning about our Father God – slowly taking the focus off myself and fixing my eyes on Him.

Would I go again? Yes, 100%! But next year I'll be camping on site!

This is the 10th year I have been involved in Interaction France, a bilingual, Christian activity camp held in Pays de la Loire. It takes place at a beautiful site: an old chateau that now serves as a horticultural college, meaning that the extensive grounds are always immaculately maintained!

We run a wide variety of activities on site – this year I organised a Biblical Greek workshop and a wide game – but we also make several trips out. A highlight is always our trip to Sillé-le-Guillaume, an outdoor activity centre that offers sailing, climbing, mountain biking and a high ropes course. The conference's aim is to help us to hear God's voice in the Bible, become more like Jesus and to go out serving Him in His mission to friends, neighbours and further afield.

The week provided such rich teaching from the Bible and we loved learning new hymns. For me, this was also spiritually significant as I'm preparing for reader training beginning this month. I struggled a bit in the first few days but became overwhelmed by God's care and interest despite failures and hurts. Our final memory verse and action song was: "... and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom."! 2 Corinthians 3:17






Team Venus getting stuck in
