Five 'Ps' for the New Year



As we start 2025, some of us may have made resolutions: diet, alcohol intake or other things. However, sadly, 93% of these resolutions are broken after a few weeks! But I ask the question: Are there more important spiritual resolutions we can make and keep, or at least try to keep for 2025?

On 5th January we looked at the 'Daniel Diet' (Daniel, chapter 1) where Daniel and his compatriots thrived on a diet of just vegetables and water. It raised questions about our spiritual diet: Is it nutritious, peppered with plenty of prayer, studying God's Word the Bible, times of worship and serving others? Or perhaps our spiritual diet is not so healthy and we have become lethargic, taking in other things which reduce our appetite for God. New Year is a good time to start afresh and focus on the crucial things of life.

As a church, it's easy to get overwhelmed with practical work. I believe the time between New Year and Easter gives us some space – in fact this

year, it's a good stretch to Easter so even more time to put our relationship with God, and our reliance on Him, centre stage in our lives.

A preacher once asked: *Is Jesus the steering wheel of your life or just the spare tyre?* For us as individuals this may at times be true. That can be true of church life too.

So, this year of 2025, I have five letter 'Ps' to share with you which can help us. "Let us fix our eyes on Jesus" as it says in *Hebrews 12:2*.

1 Prayer

Prayer is like the air we breathe. It brings God's life to us as a church and individually. It is how we align ourselves with God and His will, and how



we enhance our relationship with him. There will be monthly half-days of prayer on Saturdays in St Luke's Chapel. I trust this will be a new norm for 2025. We had a great start in January and have already announced further half-days of prayer on Saturday 1st February and Saturday 1st March.

Undergirding with prayer, all our church activities and all we do, will transform church life and bring God fully into every situation.

2 Presence

A church seeking the presence of God is essential so we can be empowered and led by God's Spirit. Worship brings us into God's presence. We are called to seek God's presence in our corporate worship and also in our daily lives.



3 Prophecy

Flowing from prayer and God's presence comes the prophetic, not usually the future-predicting prophecy familiar to us



from the Old Testament, but the sudden relevant word from the Lord in specific situations which opens the moment up to God working in our lives and in others.

4 Providence

God's providence is the continual undergirding of God's will in our lives and in our church life.

which again flows from the three 'Ps' above. We can take comfort from *Romans 8:28* when we face difficult times:

"And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose."

5 People

As a church, the call this year is to concentrate on developing our church family life in a welcoming, supportive way, caring for each other and aiming to get to know those who need our friendship and love as well as those we naturally get on with. This especially applies to those who are single (over 40% of our



congregation). So to help church family life we aim to have more occasions for us to socialise, for example, bring and share lunches, and to encourage individual hospitality, for example, asking people we don't know to join us for lunch or a coffee, or to go for a walk and chat together. Developing a dynamic community will be important for us in 2025.

Let's pray we will all put the '5 Ps' in place in our lives and in church life this year: *Prayer, Presence, Prophecy, Providence* and *People* so we can see a continuing positive transformation in 2025.

The Recorder: an Instrument for Worship and Praise

The recorder is often associated with early music and school classrooms but it holds a significant place in the history of sacred music. Its pure ethereal tones have graced church services for centuries making it an enduring sound for worship and spiritual expression.

A brief history of the recorder

The recorder's history goes back to the Middle Ages with early examples in the 14th century. Its simple construction and sweet, clear sound made it a popular instrument across Europe. By the Renaissance, the recorder was seen as an important instrument for both secular and sacred music.

The recorder flourished during the Baroque period (1600–1750) when composers such as Bach, Handel, Telemann and Vivaldi wrote intricate, virtuosic pieces where it could convey a sense of divine serenity.

Despite falling out of favour during the Classical and Romantic periods, the recorder experienced a revival in the 20th century, thanks to its accessibility and unique tonal qualities. The success of the recorder in modern times is often attributed to Arnold Dolmetsch as he was responsible for broadening interest in the UK beyond a small group of early music specialists.

Carl Dolmetsch, son of Arnold, became the first virtuoso recorder player and began to commission recorder works from leading composers of the day, eg Frans Bruggen, Hans Martin Linde and David Munroe. Nearly twice as many pieces for the recorder have been written since the modern revival as in previous periods by, eg John Tavener, Michael Tippett, Benjamin Britten and Leonard Bernstein.

In 2012, Charlotte Barbour-Condini was the first recorder player to reach the final of the *BBC Young Musician of the Year* playing a Vivaldi concerto.

The recorder family

The recorder is part of a family of instruments, each with a distinct pitch and range, enabling the recorder to perform a range of musical roles from melody to harmony.

Each recorder in the family also differs in size and tone. For example, the descant/ soprano recorder is small and light while the bass is much larger and requires more air to produce sound.

The descant/soprano is often the first instrument learned by beginners. Its bright, clear tone is well suited to leading melodies. The treble/alto recorder is favoured by some experienced players and composers especially in Baroque music. Its rich warm sound makes it ideal for meditative or expressive sacred pieces. The tenor recorder provides a mellow, flute-like quality. It is often used for melodic lines in ensemble settings but is more often used to provide harmony. The bass recorder produces rich deep tones and plays an octave lower than the treble/alto recorder.

Coffee and Chat with Janet Gibbon

St Luke's has been my church for some 60 years so I've seen off a few Vicars in that time, starting with Robert Morley for a short time in 1964 before Frank Gray was appointed, through to our current Vicar, Michael. I was brought up in a Christian family and before joining St Luke's went to Hornchurch Methodist.

I trained in floristry at Ludgate Circus which was the *crème de la crème* as they made up all the royal bouquets. I was a GPO telephonist for a while after marrying but when the family came along I stopped working. When I returned to work I worked for Royal Doulton in Clements for 15 years. And yes, the staff in the Menswear Department did bear some resemblance to the characters in the tv sitcom *Are you being served?*!

How did I meet John? I was going out with Ted at the time (fondly referred to as 'Red Ted' because he was a communist). On a Methodist Guild holiday, I prayed about the situation with Ted and I heard God say quite clearly "go and see John". I hadn't met John before but I knew he was based at RAF Hornchurch and visited my Aunty Olive on occasions. I think my mum was quite surprised at my eagerness to visit Aunty Olive but we went as soon as we got back from holiday and John was there with an RAF friend. I knew instantly that John was God's choice for me. John invited me to go with him and his friend for a drive in his car and then he asked to see me again. This was all God's providence. We were married for 56 years.

John went to St Paul's Langleybury but I felt he hadn't fully put his trust in Jesus as his Saviour and Lord so I prayed really hard for him and when there was a mission at a church in Vicarage Road, I asked John if he'd like to go. At the end of the evening the speaker invited people to go forward if they wanted to publicly declare their faith in the Lord Jesus. In an answer to my prayers, John got up and went forward ... and I fainted!

After marrying, we joined St Luke's and were warmly welcomed. We quickly became part of the Sunday Service team at Watford General Hospital. I also became involved in running the Sunday School, together with Wendy Dodson, which at that time was held at Cassiobury School and later became the Seekers group at St Luke's. Wendy and I have known each other for a very long time – we were young mums together.

In the 1970s, John and I were invited to be part of a panel at the 14–18 year-olds group, Koinonia, which met on Sunday evenings. We were asked some tough questions like "What do you think about pre-destination?" and "Why is there suffering in the world?". We came up with some kind of answer! Years later, the leaders of Koinonia moved on and the Vicar said he wanted John and me to be the new leaders. We were stunned and as we walked home I don't think we said a word to each other. However, we led Koinonia for several years and really enjoyed it.

After that, Wendy and I led Explorers for many years. I loved telling the children stories – I would rewrite, for instance the parables, as modern-day equivalents. I was an only child so I lived in my imagination. When I meet past Explorers, they say to me, "I remember your stories ..."!

It was a busy time, juggling family life, work and church life. St Luke's didn't employ youth workers at that time, we did it all ourselves.

I also managed the church flower arranging for many years and enjoyed that too. It included bridal bouquets for St Luke's weddings. John and I went to the flower market at Covent Garden at an unearthly hour of the morning to get the flowers really fresh. We brought them back, put them in water, went to work and then I worked on the displays and bouquets through much of the night. I didn't charge for the work on the wedding flowers but asked the couple to make a donation to charity.

When Network Groups were introduced in the 1990s, the Vicar asked John and me to lead one. I was reluctant initially because I was managing the flower arranging and leading Explorers but the Vicar said he'd found someone to take over the flower rota. So with Myrtle taking on the flower arranging I didn't have an excuse any more. Our Network Group later became a Home Group and seemed to attract older people so my involvement in leading Friday Club was a natural progression and I've now been doing it for 34 years!

My favourite Bible verse? Ephesians 3:20-21:

"Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen."

God can do anything but we must be in His will.

Watford Foodbank Update

During Harvest 2024 Watford Foodbank received over 7,000 kg (7 tonnes) of donated food from 31 schools and 8 churches, including 132 kg from St Luke's, for which we are very grateful. During the Christmas



period we also received over 20 tonnes of donations from local businesses, churches and schools, as well as other items like advent calendars and presents for children.

2024 was our busiest year ever as we gave out over 8,000 food parcels to single people and families in crisis in the local area, averaging over 650 parcels a month. However, due to the cost-of-living situation, we found in the earlier part of the year that the amount of food donated by the public was not keeping up with clients' needs, and consequently we had to purchase a significant amount to make up the shortfall; in some months this amounted to 50% of the stock given out. This situation was eased by some significant financial donations from The Trussell Trust and a few major local businesses. The food donations received over Harvest and Christmas have reduced the stock purchased but the cyclical nature of donations means that in the Spring we shall probably need to purchase more stock.

During 2024 we introduced a talking therapy service to help those of our clients who suffer with mental health issues, often arising through the stress and worry associated with the choice between eating or heating. The take-up of this service is beginning to increase.

In December our foodbank distribution point at South Oxhey Baptist Church closed as its leaders moved from the area, but we are pleased to say that a new distribution point opened in January at Carpenders Park and South Oxhey Methodist Church, so we shall be able to continue to support clients in that area. Our other distribution points remain at the main warehouse off Imperial Way in North Watford and at Wellspring Church Centre, Christ Church, and St Michael and All Angels Church.

Watford Foodbank is now in its 13th year of operation. We would all like to see the need for foodbanks disappear in this country but there seems little likelihood of this happening in the medium term — in fact, the need seems to be increasing each year. We are very thankful for the continuing food donations and financial support given by members of



St Luke's – non-perishable in-date food donations are always gratefully received (there is a basket in the Gathering Area) and any financial donations will be much appreciated (see the JustGiving QR code). We also value your continued prayers for our work – for our staff, volunteers and trustees – that we may continue to bring God's blessing to the clients we serve.

Dear friends,

In December I was looking out on frosty grass in the UK. The world outside my window now looks completely different with green, lush vegetation! I arrived back in Malawi in January and am gradually adjusting to life here again — thank you for praying for this transition.

It has been good to reconnect with people. My new neighbours, but old friends, Megumi and Helen Fazakerley, collected me from the airport and gave me a welcome meal. I had a warm welcome from Malawian friends



at church on Sunday but found the volume of the microphone extremely loud. I think they were trying to drown out the noise of the heavy rain on the roof! It has also been good too to meet with colleagues in the SIM Malawi office just behind my house, where I work for much of the time.

I've realised afresh the challenges that so many here cope with. It has rained every day since I arrived back

but I've been told that there was a dry period of a few weeks after the rains began. Some people have planted their second lot of maize, as the first lot died. Some have even planted for the third time, having lost two lots of seed. This is really hard as many didn't have a good harvest last year.

That all puts into perspective some of the inconveniences I have to deal with. I am thankful for the water tank on the compound as the mains water supply has been off quite a lot since I arrived. Yesterday evening was my first dark evening because of a power cut. On the positive side, I love listening to the night sounds – squeaker frogs, fruit bats and insects. And during the day, I like seeing a variety of birds in the garden.

As I get back to my desk here there is a lot to catch up on. In SIM Malawi I'm on the Director Search committee, as we start the process of searching for a new director to come when Pete Ong, our current director, finishes in September. I'll be renewing relationships with Bible colleges and am going to a Board meeting of Chisomo theological and vocational training centre next week. I have several zoom calls lined up for my international work too.

Looking forward, in the last week of February I will be going to Northern Cyprus for a conference of SIM leaders. The following week, the first week of March, there will be another international conference, this time based on theological education, run by the International Council for Evangelical Theological Education (ICETE). That will be in Albania. I'm excited about both of these events, and thankful for these God-given opportunities at the beginning of this year.



About 50 people from all over Watford came to St Luke's for the Big Parenting Questions event on 6th November. *Care for the Family* were taking this new event for mums, dads and carers all around the UK. Robin Vincent, Chief



Executive of *Care for the Family*, and Cathy Madavan, a popular speaker and author of several books on raising children, were the speakers.


We were excited to get some tips on the challenge of raising teens! Tips on responding to requests like: 'Can I have a phone?', 'Can I stay home on my own?', 'Can I have Snapchat?'. We also hoped to get some help with questions such as 'How do we know what's best for them?' and 'How can we give them the freedom to grow without letting them wander into chaos?'.

These were the main takeaway points:

- 1 Why is everything changing? Our teenagers are changing so as parents we need to be prepared to learn and adapt. As they change, our role changes we are more coach than controller. We need to support them by listening and loving them unconditionally. We are still the most important influence in their lives.
- **2** How do I keep the connection? Be in their boat with them. Step into their world and become familiar with their crew, the new voices in their lives. Be the anchor steady, reliable, dependable.
- **3 What can I do to protect them?** Know your gates and fences. Where is your line to create secure boundaries, and where will you open the gate to be more flexible? Think together about how to behave online, make a Family Media Agreement and consider the family's relationship with technology generally. We need to put safeguards in place but we also want to help them think for themselves and make wise choices.
- **4 Who are they becoming?** Help them discover their future rather than dictating it for them. Help them to see a world beyond themselves and facilitate their engagement with it. Be the person you would like them to imitate!

Wines for a Christmas Dinner

Picture the scene: it's a few weeks before Christmas on a Saturday evening in the church hall. About 25 parishioners are sitting at small tables. At the front is the Vicar standing behind a table laid out with about a dozen bottles of wine, each wrapped in brown paper.

Holy Communion? No. This is not church as I remember it. This is something different. From

the adjoining kitchen comes the mouth-watering aroma of Christmas dinner. Volunteers appear and serve plates of hot turkey, baked potatoes and all the trimmings to the parishioners.

When everyone has been served, the Vicar asks: "Now which wine would you choose to have with the main course?" Helpers put a splash of white wine in everyone's glass and we are all invited to try it. This is followed by a sample of a different white ... or maybe two?

Michael our Vicar is a wine enthusiast and he is keen to pass on some of his knowledge. As well as food and drink we are given several sheets of A4 paper with all sorts of questions and facts on the wines. Some wines are from France and Italy, some from New Zealand, Australia and other areas.

One of the wine facts is that the sparkling Vouvray on offer is: "An extremely elegant sparkling Vouvray with a fine mousse and exceptional freshness. Typically, the aromas are moderately intense, delivering flavours of pear, honeysuckle, quince and apple."

But enough of this. Two desserts follow the main course, first a cheesecake, along with another drop of white wine (or was it a rosé? I forget...) followed by Christmas pudding and another glass or two. These are dessert wines.

I'm sure you're getting the idea by now. The brown paper wrapped round each bottle ensures you cannot see the name of what's inside. The wines are listed on one of our papers and, as well as enjoying it, it's our job to guess which one is which and comment on its taste, colour and texture. We also had to guess the price of each bottle, most of which came from local supermarkets with some being more expensive than others. After that, all the wines were unmasked and we totted up our scores.

Now for some facts:

- I didn't get a single question right.
- The subscription for the evening was £15 per person, which paid for the wine and food. Most people added a bit more, and when everything was totted up, £200 was donated to the Peace Hospice.
- Michael did all the cooking himself. He's an excellent chef!
- The event was supposed to last from 6.30pm to 8.30pm. It finished at around 10 pm.
- No one left early.
- We walked home.


