40 Not Out!

Years ago, after 40 years' service many people were coming up for retirement, and if they were lucky maybe their grateful employer gave them a gold watch.

Michael, our Vicar, has just completed 40 years in ordained ministry but God doesn't do retirement or gold watches. However, on 6th July St Luke's congregation marked the occasion with a presentation and a cake (what else?).

So, what has Michael been doing for the past 40 years? When I talked to him about this, it seems he's done a great deal. We can't cover it all but here are a few snippets.

How do you become a priest?

"For me, my life's work beckoned when, in September 1976, I was resaying my confirmation promises to God in bed and I was moved to fully surrender to him."

Michael was born into a Christian family so there was no disapproval of his thirst to read the Bible or his determination to become a priest.

Did you have any misgivings? "At first, I did have misgivings about how I would handle funerals and visiting the sick in hospital — but the Lord dealt with that," he says.

He studied at Wycliffe College Oxford where services were held morning and evening on weekdays, interspersed with lectures and hands-on training, doing such things as visiting hospitals and helping at local parishes.

He also had a spell as an ordinand chaplain at Campsfield Detention Centre, an approved prison/detention centre in Kidlington, Oxford. At the time, 14–16-year-olds who got up to no good were sent there as part of Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's 'short sharp shock' treatment for young offenders. As a result of the Chaplain's influence, one of the inmates came to faith.

Following a Curacy at Woodley, Reading, Michael became Vicar of St Barnabas, a church in the middle of a large council estate in Weston-super-Mare. The church and vicarage were in the middle of a large green area — the only play area the local children had. "Sometimes it was like the Alamo when all the local kids were playing outside," he recalls.

The church was not wealthy. "I think there was about £1200 in the reserves when we arrived, and I spent that on a sit-on mower." He does, however, have a strong belief that God will always provide what is needed.

One of his challenges was a railway line that cut through the middle of the estate. The railway acted as a barrier and most people on the other side of the track didn't bother to come to church. He says God came to the rescue. A dilapidated doctor's surgery was for sale on the other side of the railway. What if that could become an outpost for the church?

The sale price was £30,000 (this was the 1990s remember). The church didn't have anywhere near that sort of money but this is where God took a hand. The Diocese discovered that it did not own the St Barnabas Vicarage and decided to buy it from the church for £30,000. Then Walter, a member of the congregation, had a vision (see box on page 3 for Michael's account).

As a result of Walter's vision, the church negotiated the price of the doctor's surgery down to £15,000 and bought it to be a community centre. With a grant from the Diocese, giving from the congregation, money that came through the post, etc., the building was re-roofed and renovated. "Prayer works and God provides," says Michael.

The grumpy milkman and the vision

Walter, the grumpy milkman, was true to his name. He did not go to church but his wife Pat did. Pat suffered from migraines. When she attended a church healing service, Walter decided to go with her. Sometimes in a healing service, people being prayed for 'rest in the spirit' — in effect they pass out, and helpers ensure that they do not come to any harm when they faint. Walter was furious that his wife 'fell over' during the service and afterwards he stomped off.

However, four days later he returned full of repentance. Walter came to faith and was confirmed and Pat's migraines were cured.

"In a prayer meeting, Walter had a vision which led us, after much prayer, to purchase the doctor's surgery on the other side of the railway mentioned earlier," said Michael.

"His vision was of a light shining from a waterfall. On each side of the waterfall were trees. Doves were flying back and forth between the trees. This was interpreted as a message from God: the waterfall was the railway and the doves were God's Word being spread to people on both sides of the railway.

"The next day a picture of this same vision, in the form of an advert for a commemorative plate showing the baptism of Jesus, arrived in the post. This confirmed our call to move to the other side of the railway. Walter bought the plate." (pictured)



Michael and family later moved to Bath (21 more years of adventures!) where he continued his ministry, before moving eastwards to St Luke's.

How do you see your challenges here? "The estate where we are is privileged and beautiful. People enjoy the pleasures of this life but it is a culture that has little regard for God and that's a tragedy. Our calling as a church is to share the good news of Jesus. That being said, we have some amazing saints among those who serve at St Luke's. We have perhaps 100 volunteers but of these, 20 or 30 people do most of the work.

"We need to grow a younger congregation. The congregation is made up of around 30% from the Cassiobury Estate and the rest from outside. At the Communion Service on Tuesdays, the congregation is mostly elderly. On Sundays, we have a wider spread of age groups but we could do with more young people."

Autumn Sermon Series

Morning services at 10:30am

We started our study of the New Testament book of the *Acts of the Apostles* in June and early July. We covered the first half of *Acts* up to chapter 9, most of which is the story of the apostles in Jerusalem and the Apostle Paul's conversion. Now, after the Summer break we return again to this inspiring book with more dramas to bring the stories alive.


Through the Autumn, we will learn about the church as it expands beyond Jerusalem, including the stories of St Peter witnessing the Holy Spirit coming upon the Gentiles and Peter's escape from prison (both of which will be dramatised by church members, currently learning their words!). Then, we will see God moving in power in Paul's missionary journeys to take us up to *Acts* chapter 20.

Following a break for Advent and Christmas, the series continues from 12th January to 15th February when we will have sermons and weekly dramas on various events in *Acts* in the morning services, while the later chapters of *Acts* will be covered in the 5.30pm Encounter services.

Come and join us as we continue and conclude this exciting series following the development of early church and the movement of the Holy Spirit.

Encounter services at 5:30pm

Encounter returned on 7th September and we started by looking at the underlying principles of the Encounter Service, "Bring something to share from God and encountering God".



On 14th September we started a new series on *Meals with Jesus* from St Luke's Gospel and based on the book, *A meal with Jesus* by Tim Chester. This ties in with our objective to meet more as a community over meals at church and in our homes, and we will see how Jesus did this.

Later in the Autumn, we will be looking at Prophetic Symbols in the Bible, such as the Eagle, Lion and Ox.

Single Friendly Church

Since the beginning of 2025, St Luke's has begun the journey towards becoming a single friendly church. One of our priorities is to create a strong sense of family among the congregation at St Luke's. This notion is upheld throughout the Bible and was what Jesus intended for His church. *Matthew 12:50* says "For

whoever does the will of my Father in heaven is my brother and sister and mother" and 1 John 3:1 calls us "children of God". God intends the people in His church to be a family to one another.

In the UK, approximately 40% of the adult population is single. This statistic covers all age groups and circumstances. In a congregation like that of St Luke's, it may include people who find themselves single due to widowhood, divorce, having never met 'the one', and people who feel that remaining single is what God asks of them. Our desire is that everyone who calls St Luke's their church will feel at home here and part of a wider church family, whether they come as part of a family or alone.

However, some single people say that being part of a church often feels more difficult than it does for married people, and report that they can often feel marginalized or excluded. Therefore, as part of the wider church family agenda, St Luke's has begun working with the Single Friendly Church Network (SFCN). This is a UK-wide organization whose aim is to encourage churches to welcome and value single people. It was formed as a result of research commissioned by Christian Connection focusing on the experiences of single people in church.

A small group at St Luke's has been meeting to complete the single friendly church audit which will enable St Luke's to register as a single friendly church. The process of completing the audit has been an illuminating experience and has allowed us to view this issue with a critical eye. We have been able to recognise all the good things that we do as a church to welcome singles (and there are a lot!) and identify the next steps to help us provide an effective ministry to all.

A fresh season with new opportunities

Since the refreshment of the holiday (including no emails for a week!) I have had more energy to move forward with various things. For a while, it had seemed like a hard slog, with many hours at my desk rather than training or teaching in-person. But I sense another change here too, as there are more in-person opportunities coming up.

At the beginning of October, I will visit Nanjoka again for about a week. This will include going to the monthly lakeshore pastors' fraternal meeting.

In mid-October I will go to Johannesburg for a meeting of SIM leaders in Southern Africa. I have been asked to lead four sessions at their conference, and we will explore challenges and opportunities in theological education in this region.

Something that I find stimulating is working on the next Theological Education by Extension (TEE) course that Volker and I are writing. It uses the overall Bible story, which we covered in the first course, as an aid to understand Bible passages. In the new course we are following the story of Abraham. Our plan is to go through a draft with a group in November, to shape it further.

Uncertain season in Malawi

On 16th September Malawi will hold a general election, including the election of President. The incumbent President, Lazarus Chakwera, is standing, as well as Peter Mutharika who was President before him, and 15 other candidates. There are many challenges for whoever is elected. Some have a very obvious effect on people day by day — inflation is high, and electricity generation cannot keep up with the

Kisumu Children Trust Update

Peter, our Chairman of Trustees, made his last visit to the Children's Home in Kisumu, western Kenya, in June. He's visited many times since early 2000 but age catches up and a new team of trustees has been formed to take the charity, Kisumu Children Trust,



forward. Peter was the founder and he and his wife, Cherry, have had a long-time commitment to many of the children from those early days. Those children are now grown up and have children of their own. Many

managed to visit the Children's Home with their families to say farewell to Peter.

New trustees, Graeme, Jonathan and Aneta joined Peter on his visit. Graeme will be taking over as Chair at the next Annual Review in Tonbridge on 18th October. Jonathan is now the Treasurer and Aneta, who has been a member for little more than a year has been

successfully promoting the charity. I call this an exciting 'New Season'!

The team had a busy schedule, much was shown to the newcomers and friendships were formed, especially between Aneta and the Home's Social Worker, Pamela. During the visit an interview was held by Philemon for a new Youth Worker. Kelvin was appointed and he assisted with the Bible Week in August when 70 children lived in. Next, Kelvin will be reaching out to the 18–25-year-olds, who are desperate to find work as there is high unemployment in Kenya.

There is at last a positive move by the government on school uniforms — children can no longer be sent home because they can't afford a uniform. In Tiengr'e School some teachers kindly helped those in poverty to get fitted for a new uniform! The Head, Alice, has a generous heart and allowed children to attend the rural school, even though they were not wearing uniform.

Feeding the children has been a priority and the Home feeds 150 children daily and now Tiengr'e School, due to the charity financing the building of a kitchen/dining room, feeds 1000 children when they are in school. What a difference this is making. In the past, I've seen children go home at lunchtime, knowing there will be no lunch when they get home.

Continuing to upgrade local schools with boreholes and proper toilets is on the 'priority' list. A school a few miles away was built in 1976, has had no repairs since then and has no ceiling boards or loos. This was shown to the trustees and they will be working to raise finance by applying to Charitable Trusts. George our 'architect' will draw up some plans at a some point. We've known George for many years and he does a good job! Some time ago, he built Noble Charity for us, a residential home providing accommodation and respite care for the

elderly. We visited towards the end of the build and he was very proud to tell us, "It is finished and it is good."

The new trustees are working well together and are excited at the prospect of this new chapter. Peter gave them a good introduction to Kisumu Children Trust and they now have to plan 'what's next', though Peter will remain as a trustee to guide them.

How do you drink a glass of wine? Perhaps you don't — in which case please turn the page.

For those still with us, we are at a Michael Norman wine-tasting evening and this is how it's done:

Look at the colour of the wine in the glass. Is it red, purple, pink, amber, yellow? There are many

options. The only bit I remember is that the darker reds have more 'body'.

Does it have 'legs'? Tilt the glass so the wine goes up the side, then straighten it up. Is some of the wine still clinging to the side? If so, it has 'legs'. Wine with no legs is a bit on the watery side. More 'leggy' wines have more body.

Sniff it. If red, does it smell of raspberries, plums, old oak, or if white does it have the scent of lemons, oranges or flowers? I always fail this test — it all smells like wine to me.

Sip it. Is it a bit sharp, smooth, sweet — do you like it?

Take a little food. Michael has provided what he calls canapés. We start with a small biscuit with cream cheese and a little smoked salmon on the top, and progress to small pieces of meat and later on even a small chicken korma and a spare rib. The idea is to see how the wine tastes with food. Incidentally, white wine should normally only be drunk with food, red wine you could drink on its own, although with food it's better.

Michael's summer wine tasting on 18th July, held in the Vicarage garden, attracted around 20 people. It was fully subscribed and we shared 13 bottles of wine, lots of portions of food and gave our unofficial verdicts on all manner of things. There were quizzes on subjects ranging from where the major wine provinces are in France to naming where the various wines on offer came from. Did you know that Zinfandel comes from the USA? Neither did I.

Oh, and there was a voluntary contribution at the end which raised £205 for Rennie Grove Peace Hospice Care. I'd like to think the wine helped....






